In Memoriam

There passed peacefully to rest at the home of Mrs. Michael Campbell Mitchell River, a respected and highly beloved citizen in the person of Mrs. Minnie MacPhee, widow of the late Peter MacPhee, who was 73 years, after a lingering illness. All that medical skill and kind attention could do to prolong her life was done but God willed otherwise and on July 25, 1939, fortified by the Sacrament of the Roman Catholic Church, which she received as a devoted member she peacefully breathed her last.

Mrs. MacPhee came to Mitchell River a bride 50 years ago and there entered upon the duties and responsibilities of country commercial life which ever finds the most effective stimulus in intelligent direction and practice of devoted womanhood.

Because of her generous, hospitable and charitable nature she was often sought in times of trouble.

Being always informed of the activities of the day Mrs. MacPhee was a pleasing conversationalist and always took part in any movement which pertained to the welfare of her family and the betterment of the community in which she lived.

Her later years were marked by suffering and on July 28, 1939, a large concourse of sympathizing relatives gathered to witness the funeral services at All Saints Church, Cardigan, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. M. Rooney, who also conducted services at the grave with the solemn rites of the Holy Mother Church which she served so faithfully and when under his final benediction all that was left of a kind and loving Mother was consigned to the consecrated earth beside her husband and two children who predeceased her to await a glorious resurrection.

There was left to mourn her departure six sons and one daughter, namely: Allen, Richard, Giles, Joseph, Donald, William all of Boston, Mass., Harry in Richmond, California; James in New Glasgow, N. S.
