Trinity Evening Auxilliary Meets

The autumn thankoffering service of the Mary Millar Auxilliary was held in the Hearst Memorial Hall. The opening worship was in charge of Miss Enid Morson who was assisted by Miss Alice Fraser. Special musical numbers were rendered by Miss Kaye MacEachern, contralto, who sang "Beside Still Waters" and "O Saviour, Hear Me." The pianist for the service was Mrs. K. S. Rogers.

The guest speaker was Rev. Hilda M. Johnson, recently a missionary in India, but at present engaged in recruiting girls for full time service in the church. Her address dealt in part with her work in India, but more particularly with the need for more workers trained for full time service. Not only are great numbers of young women needed to minister to the medical, educational and spiritual needs of people in foreign lands, but many are needed in our own country. They are needed for giving Christian education to the youth of the churches; for greeting immigrants and helping them with the problems that face all strangers entering a new country; for serving in charges that have been left without a minister; for working in outpost hospitals in Canada. Among the most important attributes these women workers should possess are: Christian character and confession, a sense of humor, the joy and appreciation of life, and a love of people. The course is given at the United Church Training School, Toronto. The present temporary quarters will soon have to be vacated and a new building provided. In view of this, advance notice is being given that a campaign for this purpose will be held from March to May, 1952.

For the final class, Mr. Meiklejohn took a one-act play, now in production by the Little Theatre Guild, and worked with the cast for the full evening. In this way he demonstrated in practice many of the points he had lectured on during the course, and assisted the directors of the play greatly by showing methods in which the players might give a more polished performance.

The previous evening, participants in the course and Mr. Meiklejohn were guests at the home of Mr. and Mrs. B. Patterson, when Mr. Meiklejohn was presented with a suitable gift from the Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild as a token of appreciation for the time and efforts he had spent on behalf of community theatre in this Province.

Mr. T. Harry Morris, President of the Guild, expressed very capably the thanks of all those who had taken advantage of the course, made available to them through the efforts of the P. E. I. Department of Physical Fitness and Adult Education.

It was also announced that tryouts would be held for parts in forthcoming Little Theatre productions, as suggested by Mr. Meiklejohn during one of his lectures. The first of these will be held in the very near future.
