History Politics Not Dull Proven By New Play Here

Tommy Tweed's "John A. Beats the Devil" opens in the Confederation Centre Theatre this evening, and its director, Leon Major, hopes it will create a new image of this country's history. "I hope the play can help derive the image that Canadian history and Canadian politics were dull," the Neptune Theatre artistic director said in a weekend interview. He commented that Canada's history is "incredibly exciting." Tommy Tweed's play, commissioned especially to officially open the Charlottetown theatre, is "dead on, historically," Mr. Major said. He commented that this was not difficult because the events in John A.'s life are dramatic and exciting. "The only basic inaccuracy is the devil," he said. (The devil, represented in this play as one Belial Burns, is portrayed as the cause of certain actions which really happened.) "I think it's very funny. I hope we'll be able to play it with humor," said the director, admitting that he is a little "twit" because it would be a new play in a new theatre.

MEET WITH AUTHOR
The plays cast of 15 spent a week going over the play with the author at the beginning of the six-week rehearsal period. Mr. Major, who termed the meeting "an exciting thing," described it as follows: "He read the play to us, then we read it back to him. Tommy led talks on the historical background to the period and char-

acter analysis. He drew us into the period; made us aware it was being a living thing." This type of play-author meeting is unusual in Canada for, as Mr. Major put it, "We don't have very many authors, and few companies producing new plays have the time to do it."

SEMI-CIRCLE
Staging is another unusual thing about "John A." Mr. Major said that, although the technique is not new, it is one which Neptune has not used before. The actors sit in a semi-circle each with a piece of furniture, a chair, a desk, etc. When the scene is to played they all get up, move their own furniture, and play the scene then move back to the semi-circle, Mr. Major explained. "There are 22 scenes in the play and we can move from one to the other without really delaying the progress of the play," he said.

"A REAL TEAM"
"Most of the people who will perform in "John A." this evening, and throughout the remainder of the two-week booking in Charlottetown, have been working in close cooperation with the provincial department of agriculture headed by Hon. Andrew B. MacRae, the Rome Plow Co. of Georgia is sending two men here. One of them is Joseph Tucker, the company Atlantic Seaboard agricultural representative, while the other man is rated one of the best "stakiners" in the United States. 4 Locals Have Special Interest In RCMP Ride
