Mets Rookie Goes Berserk

The New York Mets continue to flounder in the National Baseball League and one of their brightest young hopefuls has had some exasperating moments, trying to get the lowly Mets rolling.

Ron Swoboda, 20-year-old outfielder has many moments he would like to forget and one of the most prominent of these would likely be the afternoon he went berserk in the Mets' dugout.

The youthful outfielder who has been compared to Mickey Mantle, in mood and muscle, took a frenzied flying leap off the bench at his batting helmet. His spikes impaled the helmet and Swoboda couldn't have looked slier than he did trying to kick the hat loose from his spiked shoe.

"Don't take it out on your helmet," veteran Roy MacMillan quietly said. "It doesn't do you any thinking for you."

Swoboda has been thinking ever since and the thing that keeps coming back to him was the look on Casey Stengel's face as the 75-year-old manager spit out: "Siff down I've taken all I'm going to take from you."

During a frenetic week at Shea, Swoboda once threw his bat down into the dirt in disgust thinking Stengel was putting in a pinch-hitter for him against the Giants, when all Casey wanted to do was call him back to the dugout for instructions.

This youngster-delights in the attention he has been getting because of the 13 home runs he has belted for the Mets and old Casey will likely take a lot more from him before he will quit on leaving behind a latter-day monument to himself, such as he built with Mickey Mantle.

LEVITT TO ATTEND CLINIC

Acadia University Basketball Camp Director, Coach Stu Aberdeen, released the name of one of basketball's most spectacular celebrities, "Bunny" Levitt, as the first of six visiting instructors who will add to the excitement of Acadia's outstanding two-week Basketball Camp, July 24th-August 7th.

The camp enrollment continues to climb toward its one hundred and fifty capacity as over one hundred youngsters have enrolled from six Provinces and four States.

Levitt is a native of Chicago where he sky-rocketed to fame as the World's Champion Free Throw Shooter, a title he still holds. His record—499 in a row, and 871 out of 872. Abe Saperstein talked "Bunny" into touring with the Harlem Globetrotters in the early 1940's, and for three years Saperstein offered \$1,000 to anyone who could beat this free-throw artist.

Bunny also has the single distinction of being the only white ball player to ever play a game with the Harlem Globetrotters. He is a great teacher who imparts his knowledge to youngsters and pros alike, and fascinates everyone with his many sport stories. HUNTERS' CORNER

Black Duck Broods Are Proving Scarce

July is with us once again and black duck broods are few and far between. To date only two have been reported. Both were in the seven and eight bracket. The weather is not to blame that's a certainty for this spring was ideal for the young ducklings. There were no unseasonable hail storms with high winds that cause losses among ducklings in the downy stage. A resident of Peakes, who is a keen observer of the local black duck outlook, told me a day or so ago that there was just one lone pair of blacks at Pisiquid Pond. Ordinarily there should be fifteen or twenty pairs of blacks in that area.

A farmer-hunter in the Peakes district wanted to know why the season was extended to include the month of December and just who recommended the 5th as a closing date. This columnist has been in favour of December duck shooting. An unseasonable frost often freezes up a large area of duck feeding territory and the birds flock to the open spring holes where the cards are stacked against them. Such a set-up is nothing more, or nothing less than a "murdering match" and nine times out of ten their cooking aroma will drive a housewife out of the kitchen. The aroma from a "shell duck" in the oven is not unpleasant but a fishy black duck cooking is hard to stand and it carries this characteristic right to the table.

This columnist's idea of the duck season is: October 15th to November 30th plus a drastic revision of bag limits. The Pisiquid hunter suggested October 1st to November 30th. He claimed that farmer hunters would have a chance to do a spot of duck hunting during the first week of the month but after that harvesting, etc., puts a decided crimp in their hunting activity. He has a point there alright but... duck hunting should be a hobby and unless all concerned are willing to co-operate. The kill on black ducks should be limited to two per day with a possession limit of four. The daily bag limit on ducks should also be cut to four from six. There is no point in locking the stable after the horse is stolen.

HELSINKI, Finland (AP) — France's Michel Jazy bettered his own p e n d i n g European record for the 5,000 metre run Wednesday night by winning the feature race in 13:27.6 at the World Games in Olympic Stadium.

The 29-year-old French star, who recently eclipsed the world records for the mile, two miles and 3,000 metres, beat a crack international field that included Australia's Ron Clarke.
