PRESENTATION OF A MEDAL TO A PRIVATE SOLDIER AT GOVERNMENT HOUSE.

On Monday the 4th inst., the detachment of the 42d, (Royal Highlanders) now quartered in the Barracks here, and under the command of the Honorable Captain Rollo, were marched to Government House, and formed in front of the Colonnade, in presence of His Excellency and Lady Bannerman, the Honorable Mrs. Rollo, and the Rev. R. Macnair, Presbyterian Minister, and Oilingating Clergyman to the 42d. His Excellency having desired that JOHN ROSS, a Private belonging to the 79th Highlanders, who had lately arrived from his Regiment, now stationed at Quebec, and soon to proceed to Great Britain, should step forward, Sir Alexander requested Captain Rollo to read to his detachment a letter, from the Adjutant-General's Office, after which His Excellency addressed the old Soldier, who appeared in the uniform of his Regiment, as follows:—

"JOHN ROSS:—
"Captain Rollo has been kind enough to read to his men, the official document, which authorizes you to receive a MEDAL, for long service and good conduct, and I feel great pleasure in presenting it, by desire of your late Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel Maule. It was he who recommended you to this honorable mark of distinction, to which he considered you well entitled for exemplary conduct in the Regiment which he commands, and in which you have served for so long a period. You are now about to be discharged, and you will leave Her Majesty's Service, carrying with you, what this Medal will testify—an excellent character, which will cause you to be respected, wherever your lot may be cast—a position, which Soldiers and Civilians must always be proud of. You have heard the instructions of the Commander-in-Chief, that when Medals, such as yours, are bestowed on Soldiers for long service and good conduct, they shall be presented on parade; and I am sure the comrades with whom you have so long been associated would have been happy to have seen you receive your Medal, at the head quarters of the 79th; but as that cannot be done, it affords me great satisfaction to communicate to Colonel Maule, that I have been enabled to fulfil, so far, the instruction of His Grace, the Commander-in-Chief, by presenting your Medal in presence of your countrymen, a detachment of the Gallant 42d, wearing like your own Regiment the "Garb of Old Guel," and I am confident, that the 42d men will be well pleased to see distinction conferred on any Brother Soldier who deserves it, and does credit to the country to which he belongs. I sincerely hope, that many of the fine men now before me, will merit and receive similar Medals. I have also to give you, what I am sure will gratify you, a letter from your late Commanding Officer, who has always taken so great an interest in the welfare and comfort of the soldier, and who is so much and deservedly respected and beloved in the Regiment which he commands. He informs me, that you have a wife and family—that your children have received the elements of that education which he hopes you will continue to bestow on them, to enable them to become good members of society and useful to their parents. And I have now to present you with your Medal. I sincerely wish you may long continue to wear it, and that you and your family may prosper."—R. GAZ.
