Equal Air Time Split Sought By NDP And SC

Ottawa (CP) — The Social Credit and New Democratic Parties have asked the Board of Broadcast Governors to back their bid for free time equal to that given the Liberal and Conservative parties for political broadcasting on the publicly-owned CBC network.

They made their pitch at a closed hearing before the broadcasting regulatory authority after discussion among the four parties and time for all four parties.

Mr. Urwin said the Conservatives argued they should have 40 per cent, and perhaps 50 per cent of available time for the CBC series The Nation's Business.

Carlyle Allison, BEG vice chairman, told reporters after the hearing that a board composed of representatives of the four parties and the Social Credit and New Democratic Parties, and then transmit a ruling to the CBC.

The Social Credit brief, presented by David R. Wilson of Toronto, executive director of the Social Credit Association of Canada, alleged that the CBC was influenced against giving equal free time by the "special position" of other political parties.

NOT IN PUBLIC INTEREST

The NDP argued that "it is not in the public interest that the Social Credit party should have greater access to these facilities and resources than another party." It said the original intention in providing free time for political broadcasting was to give "national" parties right to be heard. This was determined by not making the time available equally to all national parties.

For The Nation's Business series, the NDP said, the division of time has customarily been 40 per cent for the Liberal government party and 60 per cent to opposition parties.

Free time for election broadcasts had taken into consideration the standing of the parties in

Hyndman Corps Will Enroll 25 New Navy League Cadets

La-Cmdr. Harry Thomson, commanding officer, Hyndman Navy League Cadets Corps, revealed that it is planned to enroll 25 new entries into the corps for its training season, which opened last evening.

This number will bring the total allowable strength of the corps up to 46 from its original 23 cadets. The need to recruit that number is to replace the 15 that have transferred to the local Sea Cadet Corps, RSCC Kent and the 10 increase in allowed complement.

These young lads, of 12 to 13 years-of-age, who have completed grade six, will train Friday evening from 6:30 to 8:45.

La-Cmdr. Thomson said that this year more emphasis will be placed on teaching the subject of citizenship, and the other subjects taught, in order of their importance will be: general naval subjects, seamanship, boatwork, anchoring, knots and splices, first aid and sports in physical training.

"To assist in the training of the boys, the CO will be assisted by five officers, Lieut. George Vessey, executive officer, Lieut. Harold Thorne, supply officer, Lieut. Charles Graves, divisional officer, and two other, general duty officers yet to be recruited. Religious training will come under Rev. Walter Reid.

Named in honor of Lieutenant-Governor F. Walter Boydman, the corps is operated by the Navy League of Canada under the local sponsorship of the Main Branch Naval Veterans Association.
