AUSTRALIA.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Will Attend the Great Function.

PRINCIPAL GRANT.

Criticised by a Colored Orator.

TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 8.—A Kingston special to the Globe says that Rev. J. Hector, the colored temperance orator, criticized Principal Grant's action on the liquor question, in an address there.

"God have mercy on him," said Mr. Hector.

"How I would like a debate with him on the temperance question. The Lord in Heaven knows I would wipe the earth with him so that the angels would not know him next morning."

The lecturer claimed that Principal Grant had uttered many "bald-headed lies and his remarks are enough to cause a cross-eyed cat to leave its home."

He stated that the W. C. T. U. was the "Women's Continuous Tormenting Union."

In no gentle terms he scored the Principal again for his pro-Boer utterances of a year ago and his words denouncing Canada for sending troops to the Transvaal without convening parliament. Mr. Hector said that he had just returned from South Africa and knew Kruger better than Principal Grant did. He said: "Kruger is a hypocrite who goes around with a Bible under one arm and a slave labor contract under the other to enslave the poor black man."

Coal in China.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8.—Robert C. Hoover, chief engineer of the Department of mines of the Chinese government for two years preceding the Boxer outbreak, is in the city. Speaking of the commercial importance of China, he said: "In the near future, the chief factor in the Chinese trade of the Pacific coast will be coal. There is more coal in the three northern provinces of Chi Li, San Tun, and Shen King than in any other region in the world. This coal is anthracite of excellent quality, and when even fairly good railway communications are established it can be sold in San Francisco for \$7 a ton."
