4 BREAK FROM D.C. PRISON FARM

Borden Airman Reported Missing In Quebec Bush

BAGOTVILLE, Que., (CP)—Fate of two men, missing since their jet fighter collided in mid-air with another, remained sealed Friday night in the dense bush and lake-studded land north of this RCAF operational base.

The wreckage of the aircraft was found shortly after the accident, but no trace of the men was seen.

Early Friday an all-out search was launched by five helicopters a Dakot. Expeditor aircraft were was nothing to report.

After coming to Canada from Scotland a few years ago he attended school in Kinkora and was employed in Summerside when he enlisted as a flight cadet in the R. C. A. F. in March of 1954.

After training in London, Ontario, he was transferred to Winnipeg where he graduated as an air navigator in April of this year.

RCAF officials said it is possible that the men were thrown from the aircraft by ejector seat following the collision and parachuted to safety.

Funeral Of Island-Born Priest At Malden, Mass

The body of the late Rev. Father John A. Fisher, Promotional Director of the Mary Knoll Order, Brookline, Mass., was recovered by fishermen at Boyne Inlet on the North Carolina coast on Wednesday last. Father Fisher died from exposure when the small boat in which he was in with Lieut. W. J. Burns, USN, capsized three miles off shore October 19. Both men clung to the boat for two hours, Lieut. Burns then decided to swim ashore, which due to his exhausted condition took a period of five hours.

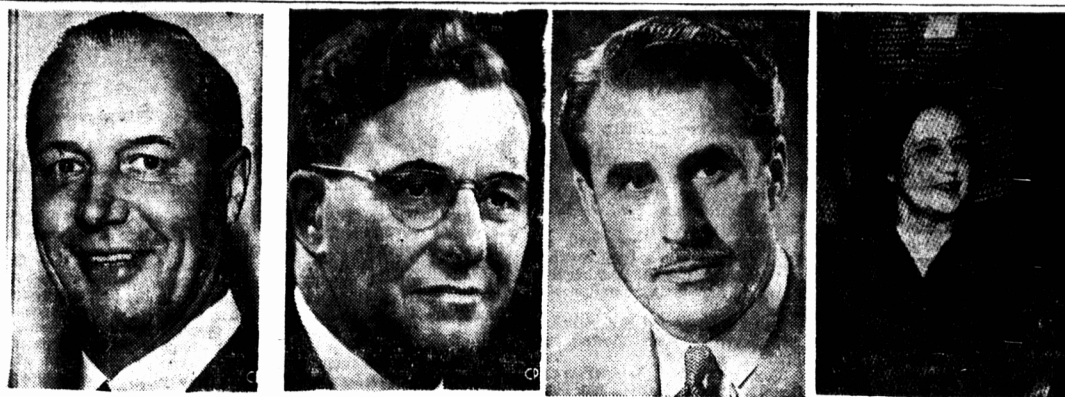
RELATIONS NORMAL VATICAN CITY (AP)—Relations between Argentina and the Vatican have returned to normal after months of tension.

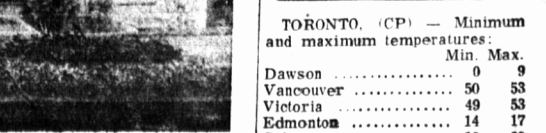
Gaelic College Extends High Honour To Premier
