

# Thrilling Dashes Highlight City Harness Race Action

Fans at the Charlottetown Driving Park last evening got their vocal chords and bank books either out of or into shape for the Gold Cup and Saucer classic tonight as they poured over 30,000 into the ticket wickets and almost as many debiles of volume into the cool night air.

Fastway, owned by Stan Mayhew of Kirkora and teamed by Clifford Chappell, got the evening off to the expected start with a 2:12.3 win in the curtain raiser, pacing to a convincing win over Miss Flamingo. However, things were not quite as predictable in the second as Doctor Alex, driven masterfully by Don MacNeill, managed to nose out Dr. W.H. at the wire. The combination of the Doctor horses probably made a great number of the patrons of the pari-mutuel wish they had a scalpel to slit a few throats for the big favorite Security Scott was soundly beaten. Considering that over 1000 doubles were out after the first dash the pay of \$33.70 seemed excellent indeed.

Josedale Co-Pilot moved up from four to three. With favored Fastway barred from the setting the place-show combination was good for \$16.70 in the exactor.

## NHL Amateurs Revise Deal

MONTREAL (CP)—The National Hockey League and the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association Thursday agreed to several sweeping changes in the pro-amateur agreement.

The changes will completely eliminate sponsorship of amateur hockey by professional hockey, do away with signing of various forms which cover options on an amateur player's pro services and allow the CAHA to handle disbursement of payments which are made when a pro team drafts an amateur player.

Announcement of the agreements, which are major departures from the present agreement between professional and amateur hockey, was made by NHL president Clarence Campbell and CAHA president Fred Page, following a meeting between the relations committee of the two groups.

It is understood the agreement will cover a period of five years starting July 1, 1967. The present agreement terminates June 30, 1967.

At last year's annual meeting in Victoria, the CAHA voted to end the agreement now in force. However, the contract contained a clause which called for two years' notice of termination by either party, thus holding the CAHA to the agreement until June of next year.

HALIFAX (CP)—It was an 11 up on the 21st hole in the other day of upsets Thursday as Gagnon eliminated Marilyn Palmer of Kamloops, B.C., in the second.

Miss Palmer captured this year's Canadian close title at neighboring Dartmouth last week and was a pre-open favorite.

The most spectacular victory of the third round was Barbara Renwick's 1 up triumph over favored Marlene Stewart Street of Fonthill, Ont.

The 23-year-old Vancouver secretary who said "I was nervous inside even if I didn't look it," sunk a 15-foot putt on the 18th green to eliminate the 32-year-old Mrs. Street.

Gayle Hitchens of Vancouver defeated Vicki Larsen of St. Davids, Ont., 5 and 3 and Jane Blalock of Portsmouth, N.H., downed Pamela Miller of Oshawa, Ont., 1 up on the 19th hole.

Miss Hitchens and Miss Renwick, team-mates on British Columbia's team that won the interprovincial match last week, meet in the semi-finals at 11:30 a.m. ADT today, while Miss Gagnon goes against Miss Blalock at noon.

## Twins Use Triple Play; Mets Humble Pirates

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Minnesota Twins uncorked the first triple play in their six-year history Thursday, riding the four-hit pitching of Jim Grant to a 6-2 victory over California.

Second baseman Cesar Evar batted in four of the runs.

The triumph gave the Twins a sweep of a four-game series and was Minnesota's sixth straight over the Angels after California ran up an 11-1 advantage the first half of the season.

The triple play came in the second inning after Norm Siebern doubled and Ed Kirkpatrick walked. Frank Malzone grounded to third baseman Rich Rollins, and the Twins got the triple play around the horn—Rollins to second baseman

Cesar Tovar to first baseman Harmon Killebrew.

NEW YORK (AP) — Third baseman Jose Pagan's four errors, three of them in one inning, tied a National League record, opened the gates for six unearned runs and handed New York Mets a 9-5 victory over the league-leading Pittsburgh Pirates Thursday.

The defeat dropped Pittsburgh into a virtual tie for first with San Francisco. Pittsburgh has a one-point edge over the Giants.

Pagan's error in the first inning led to three unearned runs. The Mets got three more in the fourth when Pagan booted three errors by a third baseman in one inning. The major league record is four. The record for most errors by a third baseman in a game is six.

Four of the Pirates' runs

came on homers.

Bill Mazerowski clubbed a Jerry May got the Pirates' major league career and Clemendon hit his 20th homer since July 11.

CLEVELAND (AP) — Chuck Hinton drove in both runs in a double and homer and Sam McDowell won his first game in almost two months as Cleveland blanked Chicago White Sox 2-0 Thursday night.

McDowell, plagued with arm trouble most of the season, allowed only three hits and struck out eight in his first victory since July 1.

The game was scoreless until Larry Brown doubled with two out in the fifth. Leon Wagner singled and Hinton doubled. Brown home-putting the Indians ahead 1-0.

Hinton added the other run in the seventh.

## Course Troubles Players At Canadian Championship

CALGARY (CP)—Defending champion Wilf Homenuk of Winnipeg Thursday fired a brilliant six-under-par 65 to take the first-round lead in the Canadian Professional Golfers Association championship.

The 65 gave him a three-stroke lead over his brother, Stan, of Dauphin, Man., and Moe Norman of Gifford, Ont., each with 68.

Deadlocked in third place with 69, two under par, were Frank Fowler and Neil Green, both of Calgary, Bill Wright Jr. of Edmonton, and John Henrick of Stouffville, Ont.

The early players on the course were plagued by low temperatures and winds up to 15 miles an hour. But later in the day, the wind calmed a bit and the sun broke through intermittently. In these conditions, Wilf Homenuk finished the front nine in 35 strokes, one under par.

He opened the back nine with a birdie, strayed to one over par on the 11th hole, then ran in three straight birdies. He eventually finished the back nine in 30 strokes, five under par.

The 65 erased the competitive course record of 66 established Wednesday by Lyle Crawford of Vancouver. Bud Edwards of Winnipeg, and Bob Panasiuk of Tecumseh, Ont.

## Atlantic Conference To Adopt Four-down Rule

HALIFAX (CP)—The Atlantic Football Conference will adopt the four-down system of American football this season in an attempt to "open up" the Canadian game.

Bert Cunningham, freshman president of the four-team AFC, announced the rule change Thursday as a move to end "the battle of beef."

The AFC, classed as intermediate by the Canadian Rugby Union, also will permit blocking for punt receivers. Cunningham said he believed the AFC is the first Canadian conference to adopt the rules.

"Canadian football needs a shot in the arm," he told a news conference. "People want to see more action. The four downs will give the quarterbacks a lot more scope."

All AFC games — the league opener is set for next Thursday — will be played under the new rules, but AFC clubs will revert to three downs and no blocking on punt returns in exhibition games against the all 8 college Bluebonnet Conference and in any CRU playoff games.

Cunningham said the rule changes had the full blessing of the league's coaches and referees.

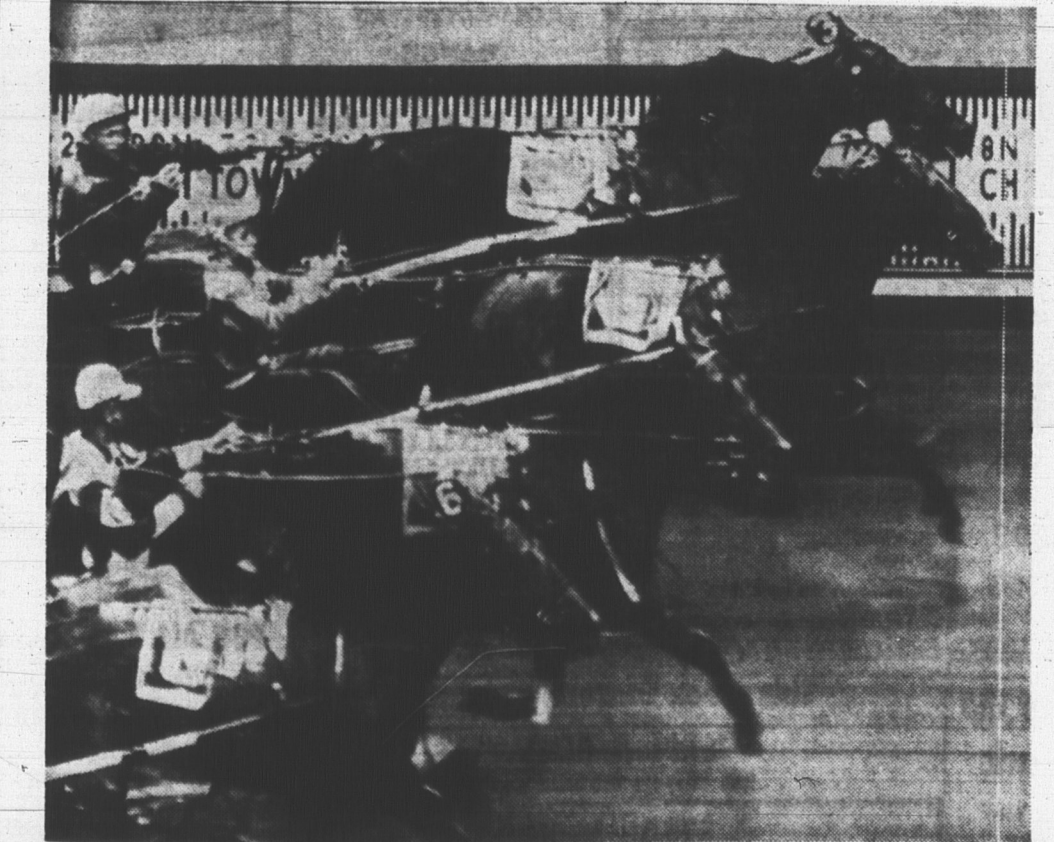
