Six Months For Break And Entry

An 18-year old resident of Belmont street was sentenced to six months in the Queen County Jail Wednesday morning when he appeared before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in County Magistrate's Court.

The accused pleaded guilty to a charge of break, entry and theft when he appeared in court on Monday. The case was remanded to yesterday for sentence.

Another youth, also appearing on charges arising out of the same incident, was charged with possessing stolen goods knowing that they were stolen. The accused, a Euston street resident, pleaded not guilty to the charge and was remanded on a bail of \$100 bond to Wednesday, May 21st.

A Douglas Street man, charged with being in possession of a number of pounds of butter, lard

and shortening, belonging to Riverside Hospital, had his case adjourned until May 21st for consideration.

The accused is the la... of nine men appearing on charges arising out of the incident. Of that total, six have been convicted of charges ranging from theft to being in possession of stolen goods, while two others have had their cases dismissed.

Two cases appeared on the docket for being in possession of liquor not purchased on their individual permits. The accused, residents of Winsloe and Charlottetown, were fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

Similar fines were meted out to residents of Mt. Edward Road, Newton, Sussex and North Rustico for having illegal possession of liquor. A Newton Cross man was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days for having possession of liquor not purchased at a vendors.

Found Tropical Isle Rugged

VANCOUVER (CP)—Life on a glamorous tropical island turned out to be a rugged experience for Kent Shelby, 23, of Long Beach, Calif.

Shelby was winner of the tiny island of Yawalu, near Lautoka, Fiji, in a limerick contest sponsored by a U.S. film corporation.

In addition to life ownership of the island, the prize included a first-class return trip by the Orient Steamship Line, a hut on the island, an outboard motor and food and furniture for two weeks.

So Shelby and his pal, Douglas Howard, 27, took possession of his island "paradise."

However, said Shelby, he had not been informed there was no water on the island, there was no boat for the motor, and there was no return Orient liner for two months.

At the end of two weeks their furniture was repossessed by the hotel on Fiji which had lent it, and they had to sell their outboard for food.

"A tropical isle is wonderful," said Shelby, who arrived here Thursday on the Orient liner Orsova, "if you have enough to eat."

"There was nothing on our island but a mangrove swamp, and it was too rough to fish. When they took our beds away, we slept on palm branches."

"We tried to get back to Lautoka in a canoe but it sank under us. We would have drowned if we hadn't been rescued by some Fijian fishermen."

Plan No Probe Of Norman Case

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian government has no intention of appointing a royal commission to investigate the Norman case, External Affairs Minister Smith said Friday in the Commons.

He also said there is no record to indicate that the previous Liberal government intended before internal security subcommittee Herbert Norman's death by suicide April 4, 1957, to establish a royal commission to inquire into the case.

Mr. Smith was replying to Harold Winch (CCF - Vancouver East) who asked Thursday whether there had ever been any proposal for appointment of a royal commission by the government.

Mr. Winch had referred to Washington accounts of the latest report of the U.S. Senate internal security subcommittee again alleging that Norman was a Communist. Norman was Canadian ambassador to Egypt at the time of his death.

The subcommittee claimed that the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency has a memorandum quoting Norman as saying that he feared he would be called before a royal commission and might implicate 60 or 70 other persons.

Disk Jockey Says Not Guilty

BOSTON (AP)—Alan Freed, New York disk jockey, pleaded not guilty Friday to two indictments in connection with disturbances that followed his rock 'n' roll show here May 3.

Judge Lewis Glogberg set bail at \$3,000 and Freed's lawyer, Paul T. Smith, was given three weeks to file special pleas.

One indictment charges inciting to riot; the other, inciting unlawful destruction of real and personal property.

The lion pulled the screaming girl through the bars of its cage, despite the grandfather's frantic efforts to save her, and tore her to pieces.

The little girl, who was decapitated, was Julia Ann Vogt. She and her five-year-old sister, Judy Lynn, had come here with their mother from Chilliwack, B.C., to visit their grandfather, Harry Jackson.
