Atlantic Acceptance Corp. Forced Into Receivership TORONTO (CP) — Montreal Trust Co. was appointed receiver and manager Thursday for Atlantic Acceptance Corp., the finance company that announced Tuesday it was unable to meet certain of its obligations. The order was sought earlier by Montreal Trust, which said receivership for Atlantic was needed to protect the company's creditors. D. B. MacKlaier, assistant manager of Montreal Trust, said Atlantic Acceptance needs to raise about \$25,000,000 during the next few weeks. He said Montreal Trust is the trustee for holders of \$13,458,000 worth of short-term notes that Atlantic has defaulted on. Mr. MacKlaier said receivership is needed to protect creditors. Under receivership Atlantic could maintain its branches and personnel to make collections, but its other operations would be sharply curtailed. "Atlantic's business is consumer credit—cars, appliances and the like—and in this business many customers won't make their payments if they think the finance company is in trouble." Atlantic at last report had assets of about \$130,000,000 and operated more than 120 branches across Canada. C. Powell Morgan, Atlantic president, said the defaulting on the short-term notes—sold through investment agencies to corporations and private individuals—was caused by a shortage of funds in the Canadian market and United States efforts to discourage sending capital abroad.

Post-Natal Mothers Insanity Discussed At CMA Meeting HALIFAX (CP) — Sir Hector MacLennan of Glasgow, gynaecologist and obstetrician, told the Canadian Medical Association here of the danger of post-natal insanity in mothers. He was one of three doctors to present scientific lectures at the CMA annual meeting here. Sir Hector said the rare but possible occurrence of post-natal insanity is usually preceded by prolonged insomnia. "Excitement following childbirth may cause insomnia, but when the patient lies awake hour after hour, her conditions demands serious attention." He said immediate action is necessary if the mother becomes mildly hysterical or in such cases was usually good, but the immediate consequences of post-natal insanity could be fatal. "I, myself, have seen two suicides," he said. Dr. Giles LePage of Montreal said patients seriously disabled by valvular heart disease, second only to coronary heart condition in frequency, now could hope for "near normal life" with artificial valves. Dr. LePage said after replacement of one or more cardiac valves, most patients were able to return to productive lives, but would continuously require anticoagulants to prevent blood clots and embolisms. REPORTS NEW FINDINGS Dr. John Lind of Stockholm, an obstetrics professor and researcher, reported new findings which may help reduce infant mortalities. Dr. Lind said his research involved physiological studies of umbilical cords being clamped after seven seconds and after five minutes—the time element being an important consideration in premature and complicated births. "Infants clamped early and late appear similar clinically, but detailed observation shows great differences," he said. Early clamped infants breathed earlier and had lower pulmonary pressure while late-clamped infants had higher respiratory rates in the first four hours and had higher blood content.

Moderates In Quebec Need Support TORONTO (CP) — Quebec moderates are "working against the current" in their province and need help from English-Canadian moderates, Education Minister Paul Gerin-Lajoie said Thursday in a speech he was not able to deliver. His text in English was read to the Canadian Public Relations Society here by one of his associate deputy ministers, Joseph L. Page. The minister was laid up with the flu in Quebec. "In times of stress it has always been a daring challenge everywhere to remain a moderate in politics," the minister said. "In Quebec today it is indeed a difficult experience to be a moderate reformer because of the strong pressure for immediate and sweeping constitutional reform on the part of Quebec opinion." Some English-speaking moderates insist in seeking hidden aims behind Quebec's demands for constitutional change, but "in fact, Quebecers mean exactly what they say." What French-Canadians want, said Mr. Gerin-Lajoie, is "a motherland." As well as more power for the provincial government, the minister urged more French in federal business, so that French-speaking civil servants do not have to "renounce their language, their set of values and their cultural patterns every morning." "This of course holds true for private industry in Quebec," Mr. Gerin-Lajoie told the public relations men. "But how much more this should be of the Government of Canada which must set an example." Quebec was ahead of English Canada in pondering "fundamental questions on the constitution and the power structure" of the country, Quebecers were dissatisfied with the present situation, but there was also a "collective awakening and a maturity of consideration of the 'quiet revolution'."
