

The suppression of religious houses is going on in France. The inmates of some of them have barricaded the doors to keep out the enemy.

GENERAL GARIBALDI and his son have acceded to the wishes of the Premier Caroli, and have resumed their seats in the Italian Chamber. Thus ends the Italian sensation.

SOME Democrat, uniting in himself the knave and the fool, has done that which is politically a blunder and morally a crime; viz., forged a letter purporting to be written by General Garfield; and he has, thereby, blasted the prospects of General Hancock. The forgery has been denounced, and a hue and cry against Democrats in general has been raised all over the country.

It appears that a "Summerside congregation" did not did not deserve a compliment for good behaviour at a recent marriage service. Our Summerside correspondent says, in effect, that the order maintained was decidedly bad, and the Journal declares that the conduct on the part of the junior members of the congregation was disrespectful, and that the Rev. T. J. Deinstadt, the minister of the church, had occasion to call them to order.

OUR correspondent is, we think, incorrect in his statement that the publication of the names of defaulters to a city is unprecedented. Defaulters names are, if we mistake not, published in Moncton, St. John, Fredericton, and other towns. To expose those to whose neglect, or tardiness, or dishonesty is due the very large overdraft at the bank—upon which the corporation is, on their account, paying heavy interest—seems to be in the interest of the community at large, and a proper proceeding. We may remark that those who desire to escape exposure had better pay up at once.

The gold reserve in the Bank of France amounts to \$140,800,000; in the Bank of England to \$128,312,650; in the United States Treasury to \$105,244,839, and in the Bank of Germany to only \$47,000,000, the remainder of the latter's reserve—\$55,000,000—being in silver. The gold in France and England is steadily decreasing, much of it coming to this Continent. In France, under the double-standard, gold is drained from the Bank in exchange for silver, but the finances of that country are in a most healthy condition.

At Rapid City, Governor Laird, in reply to an address, congratulated the people on the evidence of thrift and good order on every side, and said: "The comparative absence of crime in your midst is no doubt largely due to the operations of the admirable clause of the 'North-West Territories Act,' respecting the importation and sale of intoxicating liquors, and it must be as gratifying to the authorities of this province as it is to myself personally, who am intrusted with large powers in the administration, to find that it is attended with such beneficial results."

DESPATCHES indicate that the agrarian trouble in Ireland is assuming a worse aspect day by day. It is to be regretted that Parnell has not followed the example of his greater predecessor, in condemning bloodshed and outrage. It was not by murders such as that of Lord Mountmorris that Emancipation was obtained; and it is to be feared that the bad deeds of the present agitators will very injuriously affect the cause they have in hand. In the prosecutions the Government have done well to strike at the prime movers in the unlawful acts, and not at those who have been misled. It gives us pleasure to report that a special reduced rate has been made for the carriage by rail of lumber in car loads. The reduction, we are informed, took effect on the 23rd inst. A carload of ten tons of lumber, is now taken ten miles for \$4 instead of \$5; twenty miles for \$5, instead of \$6; forty miles, for \$8, instead of \$10; sixty miles for \$10 instead of \$13, as heretofore, and so on. This modification, will, we feel sure, be appreciated; and, as in the case of all previous ones, the railway will obtain more revenue from the carriage of lumber, and the public greater satisfaction. The good effect of the recent reduction in the railway tariff, for the carriage of potatoes is already seen; for potatoes are for the first time brought all the way from Tignish for shipment at Charlottetown. Special rates have now been made for mussel mud, limestone, potatoes, lumber, and if we mistake not for some other articles; and if the railway authorities and our representatives go on in this way the tariff will soon be a reasonable and satisfactory one. The notable success attending upon past modifications should encourage the Government to make others. In this connection we may quote the following from the Advertiser: "On

the Intercolonial cars are fitted up to carry about, 160 sheep at the ordinary fares,—a great privilege accorded to sheep and cattle dealers on the mainland, which is denied to those of this Province. Here, we have no appliances of this kind, and dealers in sheep are forced to pay the ordinary car freights for such as only carry 50 sheep. Why should dealers in this Province be ground down in this way? Supposing the Advertiser to be right, could not an arrangement be made which would remedy this grievance? The trade in sheep and cattle is growing year by year.

C. C. GARDINER, Esq., the Island Commissioner at the Montreal Exhibition, has received the following report of the Judges on the Island exhibit of grain at Montreal. It must be gratifying to our grain growers to see that the hurriedly-prepared samples of grain sent to the Exhibition did so much credit to the Province. Had our farmers time to prepare samples in quantities sufficiently large for competition, there can be little doubt but they would have carried off prizes in every class:—

Report of the Judges on Prince Edward Island Exhibits of Grain.

We have carefully examined the exhibits of grain from Prince Edward Island, which includes red spring wheat, black and white oats, and malting barley.

The display of wheats, although only three in number of parcels, were quite equal to those awarded the second prize in competing exhibits.

The black oats were very fine, excelling all the exhibits entered for competition. Their color is deep and uniform, they are clean, plump and weighty.

The white oats were excellent and would have merited a first prize if entered for competition.

The two-rowed barley is quite equal to the competing exhibits which took the second prize.

We recommend the award of a second prize as an extra exhibit for white and black oats, with an "Highly commended," and a second prize for red spring wheat and malting barley.

The number of exhibits should certainly have been larger, and we commend to the consideration of the Island the policy of increasing the number of their exhibits in future years.

Beef (small) 4 to 8 cents; do gr, 3 1/2 to 7 cts; mutton, 4 to 9 cents; Lamb, 4 to 8 cents; Geese, each, 40 to 50 cents; Turkeys each 60 to 90; Ducks each 20 to 25 cents Chickens per pair, 20 to 50 cents; Butter, fresh 20 to 25 cents; Butter tub 20 to 22; Eggs 18 to 20 cents; Hay 35 to 40 cents; Oats 35 to 40 cts; Potatoes 16 to 18 cents; Flour \$2.75 to \$3.00; Oatmeal \$2.75 to \$3.25; turnips, 15 to 16 cts.; sheepskins, 60 to 80 cents each.
