THE TROUBLE IN INDIA.

Enemy Driven From a Strong Position.

BRAVERY AND DASH OF THE BRITISH FORCE.

Tribesmen Fly Pell-Mell.

SIMLA, Oct. 21.—According to advices from Fort Lockhart, the tribesmen having occupied Dargia Ridge, which commanded Chagru on the Lima Range, General Sir Yeatman Biggs sent a second division yesterday to dislodge them. The position was a very strong one on the summit of a precipitous hill reached only by a single path along which the attacking force, consisting of a Gurkha regiment and the Dorsetshire regiment, was obliged to climb in Indian file, three batteries meanwhile shelling the rangers. The British suffered a temporary check when they reached the open space, and were exposed to an accurate fire. After a prolonged artillery fire, the Gurkhas were reinforced by the Gordon Highlanders. Then followed a magnificent rush across the open space in the teeth of a murderous fusillade. The enemy stood their ground till the British reached the rocks below down which the tribesmen could not see to fire and then they fled pell-mell. The losses of the Gurkhas and Gordon Highlanders were severe.

DATE OF THREE BYE-ELECTIONS.

The Atlantic Mail Muddle.

OTTAWA, Oct. 21.—Hon. Dr. Borden has received a cablegram from the Colonial office stating that a medal will be issued to all who participated in the movements for repelling the Fenian raid in Canada in 1866, and also to all those who were engaged in the Northwest expedition of 1870. Writs for three Federal bye-elections, viz., Temiscouata, Rimouski and Drummond and Arthabaska, have been issued. Nomination in each case takes place November 6th, and polling one week later. In view of the complications which have arisen in connection with the Atlantic Mail Service, it is announced that the Government is disposed to receive further propositions for performing this service for the coming winter.

THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.

Items of Interest Rolled Down For More Easy Reading.

It is stated that all the preliminaries have been agreed upon for an alliance, defensive and offensive, between Bulgaria and Turkey. Despatches received from Cairo, Egypt, say the Khedive is in a precarious financial position, as the result of a long course of private extravagance. The delegates from the Japanese government to the coming Behring Sea conference in Washington arrived on Monday. They are Mitsukurri and Si Fujita, both from Tokio.

Dr. Borden, the Dominion Minister of Militia, says that the order providing for retirement of commanding officers after four years' service, applies to the whole service, both permanent and volunteers.

Dr. Laberge, Medical Health Officer of Montreal, states that so far fifty thousand people have been vaccinated, but that is only one-fifth of the population of the city, he advises that the campaign should be kept up.

Ex-Queen Liliuokalani of Hawaii has been offered \$2,000 to preside over a big carnival next year in Kansas. The people out there evidently want some royalty of the genuine variety to brighten their revels, and they are willing to pay for it.

Rev. G. P. Merrick, chaplain of Holloway gaol, England, told an interviewer that at Millbank there were three and a half miles of cells, and two and a half miles were filled with persons who had committed offences while under the influence of drink.

The report of the general superintendent of the railway mail service shows that during the past year fourteen clerks lost their lives, thirty-three were seriously injured and seventy-five slightly injured. This is a larger number of killed and injured than in any year since the organization of the service.

A French general has inaugurated a plan of permitting soldiers to sing when on the march, a privilege which has been strictly denied until recently. It has also been arranged that any soldier who can play on any of the smaller musical instruments shall be provided with such instrument at the expense of the State.

M. J. Connelly, on behalf of Peter Maher, has issued a challenge to James J. Corbett to fight for the heavyweight championship of the world and a side bet of \$5,000, to take place before the club offering the largest purse. If Corbett does not accept the challenge it is open to any man in the world.

Some time ago Mr. Highbarger of Harper's Ferry, W. Va., constructed a sweet toned violin of cedar wood, cut from a tree growing on the old John Brown farm. He wished to present it to Queen Victoria, but Her Majesty has instructed her secretary of state that it is an invariable rule that offerings of this nature should not be received by the Queen.

A very touching incident occurred near Verplanck Point, N. Y., a few days ago. A little boy, six years old, named Johnny Quinn, fell from a steamboat at the wharf where his father was loading iron. The father immediately jumped into the water to save his child, and succeeded in placing the boy on the pier, but he then fell back exhausted into the river, and was thus sacrificed for the life of his little child.

A tragic accident took place in Mechanicsville, Ga., early last Tuesday morning. Mr. Cranyon saw a figure climbing out of the kitchen window, and asked who it was. Receiving no answer he fired, and then discovered to his horror that he had shot his son Robert, a lad of sixteen. The boy was very popular throughout the neighborhood and was about to enter the Military Academy at West Point. Before his death the poor lad was able to clasp his father round his neck, and to say that he forgave him for the mistake.
