TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

THE TUNNEL QUESTION, And Other Matters.

OTTAWA, March 24. In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Tisdale reviewed the case of the unseating and disqualification of Mr. Gorman, the late member for Welland, and moved that the seat be declared vacant, as the unseating of Gorman was no part of the appeal which is now before the Supreme Court, and that the Speaker be instructed to issue a writ for a new election. Mr. Laurier asked time to consider the case and give Mr. Gorman a chance of being notified. This request was agreed to by Sir John Thompson.

Perry moved for correspondence, reports, etc., between the Government and Sir Douglas Fox, having reference to the construction of a tunnel between Prince Edward Island and the Mainland. He accused Senator Howland of endeavoring to induce electors to vote for the Conservative candidates on the ground that if they did so the tunnel would be built. Mr. Perry repeated the same speech that he delivered last session.

Mr. Yeo followed him, also indulging in the same old arguments advanced last session. Mr. Davies contended that the Island was not treated with fairness by the Government. In his opinion the tunnel question was only used by the Government as a bait to induce electors to vote for the Conservative candidates on the ground that if they did so the tunnel would be built.

Hon. Mr. Foster had no objections that the motion should be carried, and when the papers came down it would be in order to discuss the question.

Mr. Flint's bill amending the Canada Temperance Act was read a second time. Mr. Bennett, of East Simcoe, resumed the budget debate delivering his maiden speech. Mr. McMillan followed with a regular blue-ribbon speech and again nailed the Grit colors of unrestricted reciprocity to the mast.

The Behring Sea Question.

A WARLIKE NOTE.

WASHINGTON, March 24. President Harrison has sent to the Senate a copy of his reply to Lord Salisbury's note. The concluding paragraph is in substance an ultimatum to the British Government to the effect that unless Great Britain agrees to some arrangement pending the arbitration by which the interests of the United States in the Behring Sea can be protected, the United States government would take measures to protect them even if it were necessary to call the military forces into requisition to do so.

FIRST OPPOSITION CAUJUS.

The Leadership Question.

SAME OLD POLICY.

OTTAWA, March 24. The Grits held their first caucus yesterday. At the caucus Mr. Laurier consented to continue the leadership of the Liberal party, assisted by an advisory board.

The question as to the line of trade policy which the party should pursue, more particularly in view of Mr. Foster's declaration of the result of the Washington visit, was discussed, and it was decided to adhere to the policy of Unrestricted Reciprocity.

James Sutherland was elected chief whip vice Mr. Yrvo.

The Malay Rising.

SINGAPORE, March 24. It is believed that the Malay rising against the British rule in Pahang, will prove to be a much more formidable movement than was at first expected.

Wreckage.

NEW HAVEN, March 24. The brig Morning Light, arrived here, reports having passed a deck house, painted white and green, part of the wreck of a large schooner.

Death of a Prominent Citizen.

HALIFAX, March 24. Henry Lawson, one of the oldest and best known citizens of Halifax, (brother of the late Recorder of Charlottetown) died this morning.

Contents Uninjured.

ST JOHN, March 24. The vaults in the burned custom house have been examined and the contents found to be uninjured.

The Strike "OFF."

WINNIPEG, March 24. The strike on the Canadian Pacific Railway has been settled, and all the men are to be reinstated.

TORONTO, March 24—10 a. m. Winds shifting to southwest and west, clearing weather, higher temperature.

HALIFAX, March 21—A human hand, evidently not long severed from the body, though he flesh was hard from exposure, was found yesterday on the farm of Isaac Archibald at Truro. There was no clue as to whose hand it is from, nor what was the cause of death, if dead the owner is.

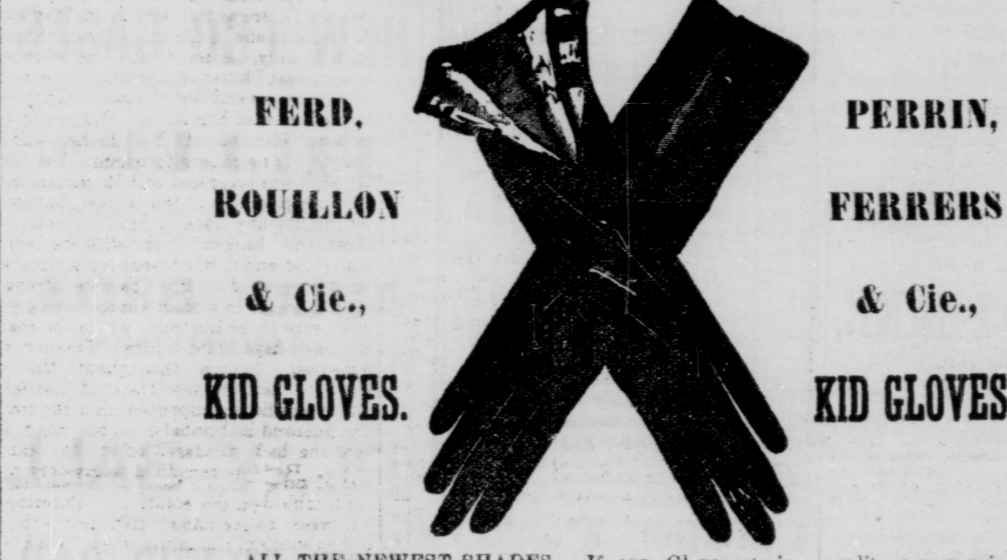
