Magistrate's Court At Georgetown

Weekly Magistrate's Court was held in the Court House, Georgetown, on Thursday, July 19th, before Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, K.C. A Charlottetown resident appeared, charged under Section 20 (1) of the Prince Edward Island Temperance Act, with having liquor in his possession in a place other than his residence. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$20.00 and costs.

A resident of Cardigan, charged with "driving a motor vehicle in a manner dangerous to the public" under Section 285 (6) of the Criminal Code of Canada, and also with obstructing a peace officer in the lawful execution of his duty, under Section 168 (a) of the Criminal Code of Canada, had his cases adjourned for one week.

A resident of Caledonia was charged under Section 36 (2) (a) of the Highway Traffic Act, with operating a vehicle weighing over 5000 lbs. at a speed in excess of 30 miles per hour. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$15.00 and costs or 10 days.

A resident of Murray Harbour North also was charged under Section 36 (2) (a) of the Highway Traffic Act and was fined \$15.00 and costs or 10 days.

Mr. S. S. Hessian, K.C., Crown Prosecutor for King's County represented the Crown. Court adjourned to Thursday, July 26th at 9.30 a.m.

Dredging Out Montague River

"The work of dredging out the much silted Montague River is proceeding satisfactorily, and already almost half the second course is completed, leaving approximately a course and a half yet to complete to Shaw's Point. The Dredge 115, and attending tug-boats Pugwash and Canoe, have been seen at work some three weeks, after having completed the first course last summer and fall.

The first course extended practically from the bridge to MacEachern's Point; the second to the bend at Kerr's Point, and the third extending to Shaw's Point. Over 100,000 yards were removed last year, and it is expected that a greater amount will be moved this year. On completion of the work, vessels of heavy draught will be able to come to Montague port, which they have been unable to do in the past owing to the shallow channel.

It is felt that this will have an increased effect on the amount of shipping done at this port, which will also affect the general status of all in the large district which this port serves.
