60 New York Rangers have finally decided that Doug Harvey is no longer of any use to them in this National Hockey League race.

Midway, the Rangers are desperately in need of rearguard reinforcements but veteran Harvey, who has been given approximately \$25,000 a season to the man who had certainly gone over the top.

Doug wasn't in shape to start the season with the New Yorkers. He fell ill and it took him several weeks before he came to the parent club but he showed very little of the abilities that at one time made him the most respected defenseman in the big league. He hardly seemed just hoping that Harvey would improve but he was travelling back and forth to Montreal and hockey didn't occupy the place with Doug that Rangers were wishing it would.

And so the break came Tuesday November 26 when the former Canadian great was given his unconditional release.

We think that Harvey's departure will help rather than hurt the New Yorkers. It must have been hard to keep everybody happy with Doug drawing the pay cheque he did. There were plenty of Rangers working much harder to get the club into the playoffs and receiving much less salary. It hardly seemed just that Doug receive one of the biggest pays handed out to NHL players.

But this was what was going on. Players and fans alike knew this and the fans especially resented it. They started to boo the bruising rearguard and that's anything but good for a club.

Now that Harvey is gone there should not be any of these jealousies. The rest of the pack can figure they are all being paid according to their value in the club. This surely was not what was happening in Harvey's case.

Now that he has departed the Rangers' camp, any other club is at liberty to pick him up. It's no secret that several clubs would stand in line to bid for him. But who will take him? It's a pity to see such a great star as Harvey go out this way. As we stated earlier, he surely was one of the greatest of his time. But that time has passed. Rocky Marciano and Joe Louis were great boxing champions but we wouldn't care to throw either one of them into the ring with any other prizefighter who was going to retire undefeated but Joe Louis stayed around much too long.

It is hard to think Harvey did too. Of course, you can hardly blame him when you find a club like the Rangers willing to pay out the handsome sums they did on Doug.

He could turn to his old club, the Boston Bruins, but this columnist is surely not expecting it. We think Doug Harvey is really through this time.

History is Made in Balloon Races As Jackson Wins

VANCOUVER — Quarterback Russ Jackson of the Ottawa Roughriders made history today in the Canadian Schenley Football Awards, winning national honors as both the Most Outstanding Player and the Canadian Player of the Year. History was also made with the first winning of the Year. This is the first time since the late 1940s when a Canadian Schenley Award winner since the trophy was formed almost a decade ago.

Nominations from Canada's nine professional football areas selected Jackson, top passer in the Eastern Conference this year, over quarterback Joe Kapp of the B.C. Lions. In balloting for Canadian Player of the Year, Jackson was also given the nod over Dale West of the Saskatchewan Roughriders.

Both Kapp and West were semifinalists as a result of second ballot voting. In lineman of the Year, voting, Brown beat out Angelo Mosca of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

Jackson's double win marks the first time since the Canadian Schenley Football Awards were established in 1953 that a player has been selected more than one of the three categories. Announcement of the winners was made last evening at a dinner attended by football repre-
