Farm Prices & Market Report

Following are excerpts from the weekly market report of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, prepared by Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister.

Livestock levels are still under a weakening process, and while hogs are steady at both Moncton and Charlottetown, sows are down \$2.00 at Moncton and \$3.00 at Charlottetown. A slide in hog prices from a high during the past year of \$40.50 at Charlottetown to a present price of \$25.00 for the same grade, and choice steers from \$32.00-\$34.00 to a present price of \$25.00, indicates a very serious contraction in the earning power of the farm producer.

Pork cuts are now reasonably priced, and beef is down from five to ten cents per pound. In the meantime the price of fish has strengthened and haddock fillets are selling at 48c in comparison with 46c for pork chops. Dried cod has the extraordinary price tag of 40c per pound attached to it, while mackerel is 23c per pound. It is interesting to note that the price of hides is very low on the market at the present time; 8c per pound is the local level.

At Montreal this week cattle are slow with Medium Steers 25.00 to 27.00; Medium Cows 18.00 to 19.00; Common and Medium Bulls 18.00 to 22.00. Sheep are steady, and hogs are steady at 26.00 for Grade A; with Sows 19.00 to 20.00.

The report stresses the importance of increased movement to P. E. I. markets. It is urgent that we meet the situation by moving our supplies in reason-

ably good volume even though prices may not be as high as have been anticipated earlier in the season.

The following are the quotations at various centers today:

Tignish: Tablestock \$1.80 per bus. at the car. Very light movement. There is no movement of seed and no quotations.

O'Leary: Tablestock \$1.80 per bus. at the car. Movement fairly good. No seed moving and no quotations.

Wellington: Tablestock \$1.80 per bus. delivered. None shipped last week. Not buying seed at all.

Summerside: Tablestock \$1.80 per bus. delivered. Slow movement. Seed \$1.80 per bus. for all varieties. Very slow.

Kinkora: Tablestock \$1.92 per bus. Seed \$1.92 per bus. Movement a little better in both seed and tablestock.

Kensington: Tablestock \$1.80 per bus. Fairly good demand. Seed \$1.80 per bus. for all varieties. Small \$1.50 for Cobblers, Sebagoes, and Katahdins.

Charlottetown: Tablestock and Seed \$1.80 per bus. Movement in general is light. The market is still draggy due to American potatoes coming in.

Montague: Tablestock and Seed \$1.80 per bus. at the farm. Nothing moving at all in either tablestock or seed.

Vernon River: No markets in either seed or tablestock during the past week.

Morrell: Nothing moving at all.

Murray Harbour: Nothing moving and no quotations.

Ontario Breeding Hogs

I have had an inquiry regarding an expected importation into this Province of about thirty-

five head of large English White Hogs for breeding purposes from the Province of Ontario. It is also stated that these hogs are held up at the present time pending their clearance from Rhinitis infection. Personally I know nothing about this supposed information, but I will take this opportunity of sternly warning our farm people about the indiscriminate importation of hogs from any area in which Rhinitis may be prevalent. . . I would earnestly suggest to our farm people not to take in hogs of any breed to this Province without first consulting with our Department or the Federal Swine Division. In the meantime we would like to know of any organization or individual who has imported hogs into Prince Edward Island for breeding purposes so that we may contact these parties for consultation purposes.

Grain

No. 1 seed oats is particularly difficult to secure in the Province of Prince Edward Island. This is due to the fact of colouring and in some cases mustiness. No. 2 seed, however, should not be difficult to secure. There are large quantities of oats on Prince Edward Island that are discoloured, free from mustiness and injury, but, if cleaned, will make good seed. It is suggested that each farmer investigate his own supply and provide at the earliest opportunity for the cleaning of his seed to be in readiness for the Spring sowing.

Timothy seed is in fairly good supply and will be around the same price as last year. The same is true of Red Clover with

a price level perhaps a little less than last year. Alsike and Alfalfa, however, will be up in the clouds as a great deal of the crop in Western Canada is under the snow. There is very little demand for hay and the price is not attractive. The Newfoundland market has been supplied from Quebec and there is little outlet in that direction. \$16.00 and \$17.00 per ton for pressed hay is simply, under present day costs, out of the question.

The feed market continues quite firm, but prices have eased considerably from the high levels of a month or so ago. The following is the detail on carlots, bulk: Oats up a bit from last week with No. 1 feed at \$2.96 per cwt. No. 1 feed barley \$3.02. Bran \$67.00; Shorts \$68.00. Proteins unavailable at any price. Shipments very slow, at least two weeks or more from Montreal. There has been some demand for mixed grains and the Department would be glad to have the names of parties offering supplies. One local mill complains somewhat about the freight rates and states that the L.C.L. rate on con-
