IN THE GROUP which includes all establishments having an annual output of \$50,000 and over. The total output of all the industrial establishments in Canada showed an increase in the 10 years, 1881-1891, of 53.7 per cent. The increase in the establishments having an output of \$50,000 and upwards was 69.3 per cent. The wages paid in all industries increased 62.4 per cent. The wages paid in these establishments with \$50,000 and over, increased 56.3 per cent.
