Jury Finds Death Due To Accidental Causes

"That on Saturday, Nov. 26, 1955, Malcolm MacKinnon came to his death by drowning in the water off Victoria Park roadway in front of Government House between the hours of 10.30 a.m. and 2.40 p.m. and his death, in our opinion was accidental."

The above verdict was reached by a Coroner's jury after hearing the evidence of eight witnesses before Coroner Dr. L.E. Prowse at City Hall last night. Dr. J.H. Shaw provincial pathologist, who made a post mortem examination, stated in his evidence that he found a few external minor abrasions. An examination of the internal organs disclosed conditions typical of drowning.

Mr. L. Gay gave evidence as to finding the body just off Gov't House after being stopped by a passing car on Victoria Park driveway. He returned to the Police Station and reported the discovery. The body was found face down about 15 feet from the breastwork. The tide was coming in at the time, which was shortly before 3.00 p.m.

Deputy Chief of Police Sterns Webster gave evidence as to the location of the body. The hat of the deceased was 10 or 12 feet from the body encased on edge in thick snow. It was dry on the upper edge and evidently had not been long in the water.

Mr. George Barter, photographer, submitted a number of pictures of the protective railing on the roadway, its condition and a close-up of the body.

Detective Sgt. A.J. Lund who on arrival at the scene, identified the body and noted tide features with which he is familiar, six inches above the protective covering. He believed that the body entered the water where found. His hat was found right by the breastwork.

Brief testimony was also given by Messrs. J.A. Bentley, Roy MacLean and Albert MacLeod.

The jury, which had been empaneled on Nov. 26, after viewing the remains at the MacLean Funeral Home, adjourned to meet again last evening when following the evidence, their verdict was reached as above stated.

Island Soldiers In Group Arriving At Quebec Today

More than six hundred soldiers and dependents are due to arrive in Quebec City today, aboard the Empress of Australia. It was announced yesterday by Army Headquarters. This will be the last ship that will dock at the Port of Quebec employed in the return of the 1st Infantry Brigade from Germany. The two remaining westbound vessels will disembark their passengers at Halifax.

The majority of the troops aboard the Empress of Australia are members of the 2nd Regiment, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, the remainder belong to the 2nd Battalion, The Royal Canadian Regiment.

When the last of the two remaining ships arrive in Canada from Germany, the rotation of the 1st and 2nd Brigades, involving more than 18,000 soldiers, and dependents will for the most part have been completed.
