MADE FROM "STARTER" Because of this, sour dough bread must be made from a "starter" saved from the preceding batch, packaged ingredients are used.

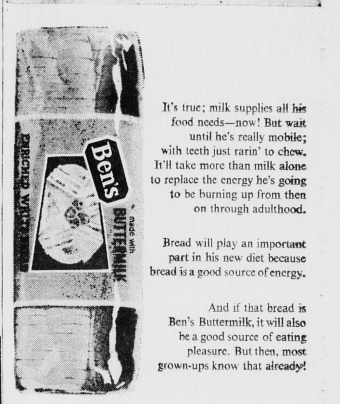
