President Cleveland and the

Fishery Treaty.

The following is the text of the Pres-

ident's recommendation to Congress re-

specting the fishery and trade commis-

sion. It will be seen that the United States

government considers the occasion a propo-

sition for the discussion of "other general

questions depending upon contiguity and

intercourse."

The marked good will between United States

and Great Britain has been maintained during the

past year. The termination of the fishing clauses

of the Treaty of Washington in pursuance of the

joint resolution of March 3, 1883, must have

resulted in the abrupt cessation of the

1st of July of this year in midst of

their ventures of the operations of citizens

of the United States engaged in fishing in

British-American waters but for the diplomatic

understanding reached with Her Majesty's

government in June last, whereby assurances

were obtained that no interruption of these

operations should take place during the current

fishing season. In the interest of good neighbor-

hood, and commercial intercourse of adjacent

communities the question of the North American

fisheries is one of much importance. Following

out the intimation given by me when the exten-

sory arrangement above described was negotiated

I recommend that congress provide for the ap-

pointment of a commission in which the govern-

ments of the United States and Great Britain

shall be respectively represented, charged

with the consideration of and settlement

upon a just, equitable and honorable basis,

of the entire question of the fishing rights

of the two governments and their respective citi-

zens on coasts of the United States and British

North America. The fishing interest being in-

imately related to other general questions de-

pendent upon contiguity and intercourse, consid-

eration thereof in all their inquiries might also

properly come within the province of such a

commission, and the fullest latitude of ex-

pression on both sides should be permitted. Cor-

respondence in relation to fishing rights will be

submitted. The inadequacy of existing en-

gagements for extradition between the United States

and Great Britain has long been apparent.

Vanderbilt's Wealth.

Before Mr. Vanderbilt died he possessed

wealth which seems almost fabulous. His

fortune was at one time placed as high as

\$200,000,000, and it was believed that he

was the richest man in the world. In

January, 1883, he told a friend that he was

worth \$194,000,000, and added: "I am the

richest man in the world. In England the

Duke of Westminster is said to be worth

\$200,000,000, but it is mostly in land and

houses. It does not pay him 2 per cent."

This was an unusual instance of boastfulness

on Mr. Vanderbilt's part, and he was

generally non-communicative in regard to

his financial condition. A year ago it was

known that he had \$51,000,000 in Govern-

ment 4 per cent bonds, but this was after-

ward reduced to \$35,000,000, partly to aid

his sons, who had lost \$10,000,000 in

Wall street. He afterwards purchased

\$10,000,000 more of the 4 per cent,
