WOMEN'S COUNCIL.—At a meeting held in the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon officers of the Women's Council for the year were chosen as follows:—President, Mrs. Anderson; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Edward Bayfield, Mrs. A. A. McDonald, Mrs. G. F. Beer; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Rosa Stewart; Recording Secretary, Mrs. McCready, protea; Treasurer, Miss Weeks. It was agreed that at the meetings of the Council each society will be represented by its president and two delegates. It was also agreed that a general meeting of the Local Council of Women of Charlottetown be held on the 26th February, further preliminaries to be arranged by the Executive.

A MIRACULOUS ESCAPE.—The Summer-side correspondent of the Guardian says: Large number of citizens visited the scene of the train wreck yesterday. The almost miraculous escape of driver McLean is the first and in fact the only subject of conversation. The engine is lying across the fence having been turned completely round through this distance and completely crushed. The wood work is splintered into kindling wood, while all the iron work is twisted and broken into an almost recognizable mass. How Mr. McLean after being buried under this debris could escape not only alive but practically little hurt is simply inconceivable.

THE CITY REPORT.—A copy of the City Report for 1897 has been placed on our table. The Report besides showing the financial position of the city contains the detailed reports of the various departments of the City Government. The report is profusely illustrated, containing very good likenesses of the Mayor and Councillors and the Water Commissioners, as well as the City Recorder, the City Clerk, the Secretary of the Board of Water Commissioners, and the City Surveyor. There are also several good views of the city schools and the park roadway. Altogether the Report is highly creditable to the energetic City Clerk; and Mr. Coombs, the printer, has performed his part of the work in a satisfactory manner.

**CANADA AND IMPERIAL DEFENCE.**

(Montreal Star.)

Sir Richard Cartwright has been declaring our loyalty to the Empire at Toronto, and Sir Michael Hicks-Beach has been suggesting that we prove it by contributing something to her naval defences. Probably nothing would be more popular in Canada than the building and manning of a Canadian battleship to be placed at the disposal of the British Government. Other methods of dropping the "mitt" into the Imperial box may be proposed which will be more in keeping with our resources and needs and perhaps worthier of our position in the Empire; but it is doubtful if any would be more spectacularly popular.

Two things certainly might be done very easily. A recruiting station for a Canadian regiment could be established in the Dominion, and a training ship where Canadian youths bitten with a desire to serve in the navy might be initiated, could be anchored at one of our ports. This would foster a personal interest among our people in Imperial campaigns all over the world, and tend to increase the solidarity of the British nation whose boundaries include Australia and Devonshire, Dawson City and London Town. A family who had a son fighting on the frontiers of India or sailing with a ship in the China Sea, who realize very vividly that they belong to the people which is leading in the government of the planet.

Another line our contribution might take is assistance in maintaining the defences at Halifax and Esquimaux. This would be an improve-your-own property sort of a policy, which might have considerable aid in its defence, and would directly relieve the Imperial Treasury. We have already been doing something toward improving our militia, notably by the purchase of a new arm; but it would appear that Sir Michael would like the Canadian contribution to take a form which would leave the "Home" Government free to divert its energies to the advance in Africa and the protection of our commercial interests in the Pacific.
