Police Probing Break At Georgetown Legion Home

GEORGETOWN — The Royal Canadian Legion Hall on Glen Street in Georgetown was broken into sometime late Sunday night or early Monday morning and a quantity of liquor was stolen.

The break was first discovered Monday morning when some children were reported to have found some beer bottles on the ground outside a downtown window. Later in the day a broken window was noticed and Alex Arsenault, branch president, was notified.

It is estimated that four cases of beer and three full bottles of liquor, the total stock on hand at the time, were taken in the break.

A peanut vending machine was broken and taken from the building on Monday morning. It contained only 15 cents. A newly full bottle of liquor was apparently drunk in the scene by the thieves and the empty bottle was left on the canteen counter. Two part bottles of beer were also found on the counter.

Outside, between the hall and the street, was found a half case of beer with all the bottles smashed but still with the caps on.

Entry was gained by placing a ladder against the side of the building to reach the downstairs window about eight feet from the ground, smashing the window and releasing the catch.

The liquor and beer had been locked in a special locker and to gain entry the thieves apparently used a hammer and a chisel to break the lock.

The last break at the Legion Hall was last March when the building was located on Richmond Street. At that time a quantity of liquor was also stolen.

Town police constable Ernest MacLean and the RCMP are investigating the latest break.

Livestock Director Urges Ayrshire Herd Expansion

Island Ayrshire breeders were urged yesterday afternoon by provincial livestock director Lou Roper to start a campaign to create more interest in Ayrshire production in the province. He was speaking at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Ayrshire Breeders Club, held at Birch Court.

Pointing out that there were only 11 Ayrshire breeders at yesterday's meeting, Mr. Roper said "there must be a great number of Ayrshire breeders in this province. Why aren't they here? There are just 11 here. There should be 111 here."

"In comparison, the Holstein breeders are going fast and furious in the province — they're flourishing and going ahead," Mr. Roper said.

Mr. Roper was critical of a picture in a national Ayrshire journal which showed an Ayrshire receiving an award for 8,000 pounds milk production. "That's just an ad for their product," he said, "who come up with 11,000 or 12,000 pounds production."

Mr. Roper said more emphasis should be placed on commercial breeding. "We cannot expect to flourish on a hobby basis," he said.
