### Confederation Makes First Strait Crossing

The first vessel to cross the Northumberland Strait yesterday was the MV Confederation which left Borden at 6:38 with 5-10 cars. It returned from Cape Tormentine at 7:30 with six 10 vehicles, it was reported from Borden.

The SS Prince Edward Island was the second ferry to cross and she left Borden at 8 o'clock with 6-10 vehicles.

The MV Abegweit was put into operation at 10 o'clock, while the SS Scotia II remained tied up, due to lightness of traffic which didn't warrant her use.

The limited ferry service being maintained at Borden includes passengers, private cars and camping trailers.

Reports from LMT indicate that bus passengers will be required to transfer from the bus at Borden and will board another bus at Cape Tormentine. The same system holds true for bus travellers moving in the opposite direction.

Truck traffic is being accommodated at Wood Islands under the reservation system, coordinated through the emergency measures control center.

### Judy LaMarsh Gives Replies To Questions

OTTAWA — Minimum wage rates on all federal government construction contracts in Prince Edward Island are established on the standards set by the Fair Wages and Hours of Labor Act, state secretary Judy LaMarsh said in the Commons this week.

She was replying to a question on the order paper from Melvin McQuaid, MP for Kings, who asked if the government would assure that rates on all federal projects, including the causeway construction would not be below provincial standards.

Miss LaMarsh said that the minister of welfare and labour for PEI sent a copy of a minute to the Department of Labor's Fredericton office, with a request that wage rates for federal projects be brought up to provincial government standards.

In reply to another question, Miss LaMarsh told Heath MacQuarrie, MP for Queens, that Bell Island in Newfoundland has been designated under the manpower mobility program as an area in which resident can obtain grants for their transportation, the cost of moving their household effects and resettlement allowances to move to other areas in Canada where there is employment for them.

As of July 8 this year, 29 former employees of the Dominion Steel and Coal Co. Ltd. had been assisted in finding employment in Newfoundland under the mobility program.

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### Driving Charge Dismissed

Magistrate Chester S. MacDonald dismissed a charge of driving in a manner dangerous to the public against Phillip Ralph Lettues of Tryon when he appeared in Summerside county court yesterday morning.
