Let's Talk It Over

Miss Doris Anderson, director of Home Economics at Prince of Wales College, made a rather startling statement in her very fine address in the Summerside High School auditorium last week. She said, in effect, that as a rule, universities train women to be capable men. Home Economics, she said, was just as important to a girl's future efficiency as an engineering course was to a man who was taking up that sphere of activity, and yet for many years Home Economics had been a sort of sideline which received much less attention than the regular courses.

We remember that Domestic Science, as it was formerly called, was little more than instruction in the art of fancy cooking, and very sketchy instruction at that. Now it embraces just about everything that tends to make a well-ordered happy home. If the students of Domestic Science twenty years ago were to see the comprehensive training in home economics carried on at Summerside High School un-

der the direction of Mrs. Allison MacLean, they would be amazed.

Criticism often levelled at the old course was that the students learned precious little of the actual duties and responsibilities of a home, but such criticism is no longer justified. We believe the day is not so far distant when the time allotted for Home Economics in the modern school will be a much greater percentage of the total time given to teaching girl students than it now is.

Slight Chances of Infecting Humans

OTTAWA, Feb. 27 — (CP) — Chances of humans becoming infected by foot-and-mouth disease are "extremely remote", the agriculture department said yesterday.

Dr. C. A. Mitchell, the department's chief animal pathologist, said there has been a case or two in history but foot-and-mouth disease in humans is so rare as to constitute "a phenomenon."
