Teachers Urge Equal Cost Of Living Bonus

The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held yesterday afternoon with Dr. R. G. Lea in the chair, who welcomed Colonel Keith M. Johnston as a member of the Board appointed by the City Council in place of Mr. Ian A. Burnett resigned.

A delegation of teachers with Miss Ann Matheson as leader waited on the Board urging an equal cost of living bonus of \$200.00 to all teachers on the staffs of the City Schools.

It was decided that non-resident pupils who have not paid their tuition fees must leave the schools within 30 days.

The report of the Art Supervisor was read as was also the report of the Truant officer.

Mr. J. A. S. Williams was granted leave to allow him to attend a meeting of the Directors of the Canadian Teachers Association in Ottawa.

Mrs. Lantz and Colonel Johnston were appointed a committee to look into the possibility of securing some one to take over Physical Training in the four City Schools.

Research Council Activities Reviewed

OTTAWA, Jan. 7 (CP) - Canada's National Research Council roamed widely through the universe of science in 1951. Its experts reached into fields as varied as analyzing the air of distant planets, producing new atomic materials and developing better anti-freeze for car engines.

The council, government agency for co-ordinating scientific studies, summarized its 1951 work in a year-end statement today, and indicated defence and defence production were in the forefront of its activities.

On the atomic front, the council announced the discovery of two new isotopes—radio-active particles useful in industry and medicine—on the Chalk River pile.

Whether practical uses have been found for the new isotopes was not indicated.

In its defence work, the council concentrated largely on aeronautical, building and radar research. For supersonic aircraft development, the council put into operation a wind tunnel with air speeds up to five times the speed of sound.

In the field of radar, the council reported progress—without disclosing details—on its application to artillery fire control and in the detection of aircraft. It said a new design of a medium-range radar used in the Second World War now is going into large-scale production.

With the defence of the North growing in importance, the council continued studies on the best means of building in that area. No specific findings were reported, but the council said plans are being made for a "permafrost" research station in an unnamed location.

In the field of applied biology, N.R.C. scientists came up with some food discoveries.

One was a new method of making citric acid from sugar-beet molasses. Another was a means of improving the flavor-retaining qualities of some vegetable oils, though the council noted this was at the expense of some of the nutrition value.

Railway shippers of food will benefit from a few other developments. Construction changes in refrigerator cars' ice bunkers and air-circulation systems will drop their temperature by five degrees. The council said the railways have adopted the innovations.

In its chemistry studies, the council brought out a rain-repellent paint for airplane windcreens that already is outselling available production. It worked on fire-resistant paints, moth-proofing of fabrics and the improvement of anti-freeze.

Probing the heavens in the interests of "pure" science, the council's astro-physicists studied, among other things, the atmospheres of the far-off planets Uranus and Neptune. They found hydrogen is abundant in them. Another continuing study was that of the cosmic-ray bombardment of the earth, still largely a mystery to the scientists.

Stresses Maritime Opportunities At International Fair

Mr. Farquhar is keenly interested in the annual Fair and feels that Maritime business firms should take full advantage of its publicity opportunities.

The Trade Fair each year attracts a large number of buyers from all parts of the world and provides an excellent opportunity for Canadian tradesmen and manufacturers to put their products before the world and create new markets for themselves, he explained.

Mr. Farquhar was recently named to his position and has been actively touring the Maritime Provinces discussing the Fair with manufacturers, Boards of Trade and civic and provincial authorities. He advises that the Government of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have offered assistance to business people of their provinces who wish to exhibit at the International Trade Fair.

The assistance will take the form of paying 50% of rentals for booths.

Mr. Farquhar will be in this Province for several days discussing the Fair and explaining its operation to all interested.

Defence Dept. May Launch Fire Probe

OTTAWA, Jan. 7 (CP) - The Defence Department is expected to name a commission soon to make an inquiry into the causes of a series of fires which caused more than \$5,000,000 damage in the last two years.

The investigation, with the R.C.M.P. participating, will go beyond the normal checkups made after each blaze and will try to establish some sort of pattern which could explain fires which officials now feel have been occurring with puzzling frequency.

Regular checks have failed to establish any pattern of cause, either of sabotage or any other background. In many cases, origin of the blaze remains a mystery.

Most notable outbreaks in the last two years were the Plouffe Park Ordnance Depot fire in Ottawa last year which caused \$1,000,000 damage and the recent blaze at the Trenton, Ont., Air Force base which cost more than that.

BULLDOZERS SAVE

EST. There was an early suggestion the fire might have been caused by an over-heated electric pump. It spread to a huge pile of automobile tires.

Black smoke poured over the snow-covered town in the flickering light of jittery electric lights. Tires destroyed—many of them for bulldozers, tractors and other construction vehicles—were estimated to be worth \$250,000.

(Continued from Page 1) from 800,000 to 1,500,000 tons from outside sources, mainly the U. S., in 1952 to keep its civilian and military output rolling.

2. Tin—The U. S. has virtually exhausted its available tin supply because of its refusal to pay more than a \$12 a pound British Malayan tin is available—but at a higher price.

3. Copper—Both American and British industry urgently need more copper.

4. Aluminum—American plane production at present is being hampered by an aluminum shortage. Britain gave up part of its Canadian-manufactured supplies to the United States in November but with the understanding it would be repaid.

5. Sulphur—Britain still is suffering from an acute shortage even though international allocation has eased the scramble.

Informants who briefed reports at the morning session stressed that Truman and Churchill in discussing Atlantic Pact matters realized that any changes in pact machinery would require approval by all 12 North Atlantic countries.
