**Small Boy Touches Off Fire Which Guts Kensington Home**

The residence of Mr. Fred Murphy of Kensington, together with most of its contents, was almost completely destroyed by fire which broke out about 7:30 last evening. The fire was caused by a young son of the family, aged about four years, who was alone in the home for a short time, and who in some manner obtained some lighter fluid and was playing with it. Fortunately he was able to escape from the home unaided.

On the arrival of the Kensington Fire Department the flames were well advanced and nothing could be done to save the dwelling or its contents. The fire brigade was able, however, to control the flames and prevent the fire from spreading and by their efforts were responsible for saving the entire residential area. Along with the household furnishings the fire loss included a supply of new clothing purchased earlier in the evening for the children to be worn at the school closing. Mr. Murphy, a fisherman, was away from home and Mrs. Murphy had gone out for a few minutes to a nearby store. When the fire broke out eight other children of the Murphy family were playing with the home. Within two hours of the outbreak of the fire, the Red Cross Disaster Committee, organized in the town in January, had procured a house, furnishings, clothing and bedding as well as food for the family. The president of the committee is Mr. Willard Stewart, chairman of food and clothing, Glen Cotton, chairman of housing committee, Athol Cotton.

Later last night the Fire Department was standing by in case the fire would break out and it was proposed that the men stay on guard all night in case of further danger to the

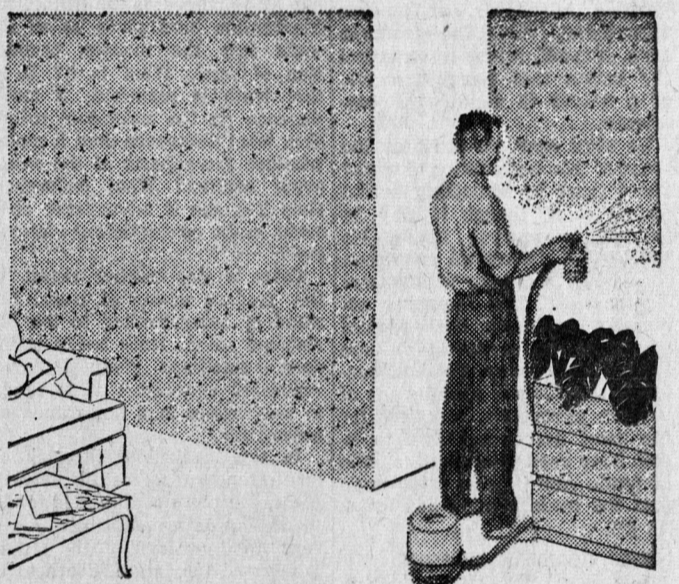
