Air Firm Plans Dartmouth Plant

MONTREAL (CP) — Canadian Liquid Air Ltd. plans to build a \$500,000 plant at an industrial park site in Dartmouth, N.S., the company said Wednesday.

The new building will replace present facilities in Halifax and is part of a \$2,000,000 expansion program being undertaken by the company in the Atlantic provinces, said the company.

British Family Doctors Split In Gov't Battle

SWANSEA, Wales (Reuters) — Britain's family doctors, battling the Labor government for better pay and working conditions, appear split within their own ranks.

The annual congress of the British Medical Association, which represents about 80 per cent of doctors running the state-operated health service, was told doctors were making the profession suspect in the eyes of the public and the government.

Dr. Eric Townsend, the main critic, told the congress an independent commission should be set up to study the situation, but the suggestion was voted down.

Another voice of discontent was heard when the Medical Practitioners' Union, representing about 5,000 doctors, issued a statement opposing a British Medical Association decision Saturday demanding that health service patients pay doctors a consultation fee.

Nearly 18,000 of the 23,000 family doctors practising in Britain have already placed undated resignations in the hands of a committee negotiating with the governments on their demands for better alternative methods of payment.

The medical Practitioners' Union said it was against direct charges on the patient and felt it was the government's responsibility to decide how to raise the money to pay for the health service.

At present, all adults pay a weekly sum to the government which finances the entire system, making consultations, medicine and treatment free. The doctors are paid by a complex system based essentially on the number of patients on their lists. Now the consultation fee has been added to the list of conditions for continuing to operate the state service.

Automobile Safety Features Said Buying Public Decision

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fredrick G. Donner, chairman of General Motors said here his company must operate in "a climate of public acceptance" in adding safety features to GM models.

"If we were to force on people things they are not prepared to buy, we would face a customer revolt," Donner said in testimony at a United States Senate hearing on auto safety. Donner told the subcommittee "no consideration is more important to us than safety," and described a long string of improvements gradually added to cars.

He said offering innovations as optional equipment permits the customer to tailor the cost of a car to his own desire.

"From a commercial standpoint, in a competitive marketplace, this must be the approach until a very high proportion of customers select the item or unless there are other compelling reasons for standard installation. When this point is reached, the items can be included as standard equipment and required selling-price adjustments made to cover the additional costs involved."
