NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It is stated that 17,000 applications have been made at Pretoria to join the new police force that is being organized for service in the Transvaal. The eagerness to join is ascribed chiefly to the popularity of General Baden Powell.

—Liberal speakers on the tours are saying a great deal about the evil results of the turning out of Alexander Mackenzie in 1878; and the Montreal Gazette remarks that Mr. Mackenzie was also turned down in 1879. The Conservatives turned him out in open fight. The Liberals turned him down in private caucus. It was the turning down that ended him.

—The Montreal Gazette says truly that "Conservatives who stir up race strife are catching it in the Liberal press, and they should. The stirring up of national strife is work that Conservatives can leave to the Greenways and Tartes of the Liberal party. Conservatives can only be poor imitators of these adepts, and cannot profit by their imitation."

—James B. Forgan, President of the First National Bank of Chicago, says that in 1896 the total deposits in all the banks of that city were \$177,261,714, while in 1900 there were \$361,992,904. "The enormous increase in bank deposits, and in bank business generally," says Mr. Forgan, "is the best evidence of the increased prosperity of Chicago." Other bankers in other parts of the United States report in like manner, and the United States have not given any preference to British importations. In point of fact the duties they impose upon British as well as upon Canadian products, have, since 1897, been higher than ever!

—Lord Roberts having stated definitely that his return from South Africa will be deferred considerably beyond the 5th of November, it appears that there is still considerable work for the British army in South Africa. The break up of the Boer armies has not yet had time to be communicated to the irregular bands roaming through the country to the southwest of Pretoria. So soon as this news reaches them, however, it may be taken for granted that they will not much longer keep the field. Britain has not profited much by the subjection of the Boers in the way of artillery, the enemy having carefully and scrupulously destroyed every gun in their possession and deposited the fragments in various spruits along the line of their memorable march to Koomatiport.

THE FARMERS' BUSINESS.

A Conservative Government established the Canadian experimental farms and began the seed testing and other work carried on on them to the advantage of agriculture throughout the country. A Conservative government appointed the first Dominion dairy commissioner and instituted the system of instruction in dairying that proved so profitable to the older provinces, and to the commercial interests therein. A Conservative government so adjusted the duties on pork and pork meats that Canadian hog raisers first secured the home market for their industry and then reached out for the British market; to which they now send thirty-five million pounds of bacon, ham, etc., a year. A Conservative government first arranged for the shipment of perishable farm and dairy products in cold chambers, opening the way for a large increase in the exports of dairy goods, butter especially.

A letter from Sir Charles Tupper to the farmers of Canada indicates the lines on which he proposes to supplement the work so well begun by his predecessors. The testimony of those engaged in and watching the trade shows that Australasian and Californian fruit, though it has to be carried a much greater distance, reaches the consuming market in London in better condition than Canadian fruit. This means that an avoidable loss restricts the profits on and prevents the development of a trade which promises large advantages. Sir Charles Tupper's proposal is to extend on the best lines the work which Conservative Governments began, to put Canadian fruit producers on a footing of equality, as to means of shipment and speed of transport, with the most favored of their competitors, wherever these are found. And what is done for the fruit growers will be done for the poultry raisers, dairymen, vegetable growers, etc. The men who began intelligent government work for agriculture propose to advance the standard to the needs of the case. Sir Charles Tupper's is a proposal of business statesmanship that speaks for itself.—Montreal Gazette.

MILITIA MATTERS.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1.—The department of militia has as yet taken no steps towards arranging for the reception at Halifax of the special service battalion, on their return from South Africa. It is understood that the men will be paid off and discharged at Halifax. There will be no parades in the upper province cities except to local men. It is assumed that all the soldiers will be anxious to get to their homes as speedily as possible.

General O'Grady lately, recently severely sprained his knee, and is now confined to his bed.

Col. Cotter, assistant adjutant general of artillery, has just returned from the maritime provinces camps of instruction. This was his first official visit there, and the colonel was delighted with the sterling class of recruits who presented themselves.

The report that the department of militia has not done anything to secure the long service medals, turns out to be correct. Last February all documents in connection with the matter were forwarded to the British government, and no reply being received up to May, Lord Strathcona in that month was asked to stir up the authorities at home. So far no answer has been received.

Col. Robert Cartwright, assistant adjutant general at headquarters, is a patient in St. Luke's hospital. He is progressing favorably after an operation consequent upon an accident received in South Africa.

OBITUARY.

It is with feelings of deep regret that we announce today the death of Mrs. Michael McAulay, which occurred at her home in St. Catherine's, on the 29th of September. The deceased had been ailing for a long time before her illness became serious. Mrs. McAulay was the mother of ten children, seven of whom survive her. The deceased lady was a model of Christian virtue. She was possessed of gentleness, devotion and tender heartedness that made her a favorite with all.
