

# Grants For \$308,337. Going To Amateur Sport

OTTAWA (CP) — Federal grants totalling \$308,337 under the Fitness and Amateur Sport Act for various sports associations and projects were announced Monday by Health Minister Montiel.

Of the total, \$189,504 is for expenditure during the current fiscal year ending March 31 and the balance of \$118,833 is for the 1963-64 year.

This fiscal year's grants include \$50,000 for the Canadian Olympic Association to assist Canada's participation in the 1963 Pan-American Games in Sao Paulo, Brazil, and \$30,000 for the Calgary Olympic Development Association.

The latter grant is in addition to one of \$35,000 last fall to the Calgary association to support its bid to hold the 1988 winter olympics at Banff, Alta.

The 1963-64 grants, subject to parliamentary approval, include a further \$30,000 for the Canadian Olympic Association as a second payment covering participation in next spring's Pan-American Games, and \$50,000 to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association for national hockey leadership courses at five Canadian universities.

## RECOMMENDS GRANTS

Under the Fitness and Amateur Sport Act, Parliament allocated \$5,000,000 annually for this field. Individual grants are announced by the health department, the responsible govern-

ment agency, on recommendations made by the National Fitness Council.

Other grants approved for the current fiscal year include: Canadian Amateur Ski Association, \$9,250 to help finance training programs during the 1963 Canadian ski team, to conduct a leadership training program and to hold national coaching schools for ski instructors.

Canadian Sports Advisory Council, \$10,000 to assist in conducting a leadership training program and to hold national representatives of nationally or-

ganized sports to discuss coordination of sports and fitness matters and the proposed Canadian games festival.

Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, \$9,250 to help finance trials for Canada's Pan-American Games team with \$5,377 going to boxing, \$2,362 to gymnastics, \$2,088 to wrestling and \$1,067 to weight-lifting.

Canadian Youth Hostels Association, \$4,350 toward salaries and travel expenses of two field workers from Jan. 1-March 31 of this year in development of a chain of youth hostels of Quebec City to Niagara Falls.

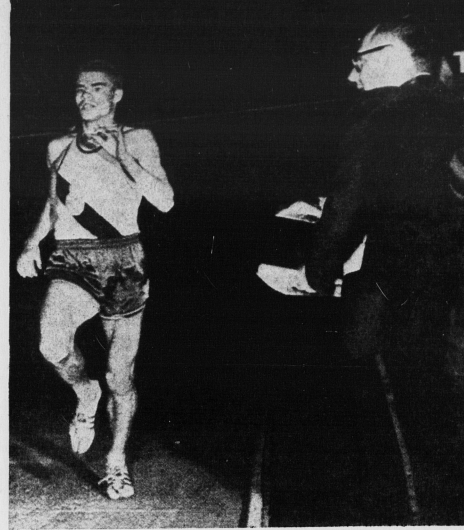

# Genuine Hillbilly Makes Debut On Pro Golf Trail

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — The name is Dock Gross and if he isn't the longest hitter in golf he is the only admitted genuine hillbilly in the game.

He stands 6 feet, 4 1/2 inches on his rather ample feet, plays out of Knoxville, and never ventured out of the hills of his native Tennessee until last December when he was 29.

Dock now is 30 and he came to the Wild West to make his debut on the winter golf trail. Dock failed to qualify for the Los Angeles Open. Part of his troubles stemmed from the fact that he lost miles and many hours of sleep on the freeways in California.

**QUALIFIES FOR OPEN**  
He came to San Diego and did qualify for the tournament here.

"Can he hit a ball as far, pardon, as far as George Bayer, who is generally regarded as the longest hitter in golf?" Dock blushed a little and replied: "I don't know but that I've hit some good ones."

Gene Grection, sports editor of the San Diego Evening Tribune, asked Dock how he got his first name.

"It seems his parents were debating what to name the fourth of their seven offspring and the attending physician suggested: 'Why don't you name him after me?'"

**SOUNDLED CAPITAL**  
This sounded capital, so the baby was promptly named "Dock." It was just that simple. Nothing stinky like, say, "Doc."

Tom Siler, sports boss of the Knoxville News Sentinel, recently called Gross' home course — it's known as the Whites Municipal — and asked how Dock was coming along with his preparations for the western adventure.

"The last four days," Siler was advised, "he shot 59, 62, 60 and 61."

"That was right, Dock confirmed here, but modestly he said that Whites is only a par-70 course. He didn't want to be shot but he said he has shot 57."

## Decision Sought This Weekend

NEW YORK (AP) — Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur will be asked to make a binding decision in the AAN-CAA sports controversy if the rival groups can't reach agreement in their arbitration meetings here this weekend.

Spokesmen for both the government and the famed five-star general made this clear after announcement Monday that the first meeting would be held here Friday.

"The general is to serve as an arbitrator, not a mediator," said a MacArthur aide. "If the two sides cannot reach agreement, Gen. MacArthur will be expected to offer a formula, and the rival factions will be expected to abide by it."

MacArthur will meet with picked representatives of the Amateur Athletic Union and the National Collegiate Athletic Association, who have been feuding for 2 1/2 years over control of the nation's amateur sports program.

**CHOSEN BY PRESIDENT**  
The retired general was chosen by President Kennedy as arbitrator after previous attempts, including personal inter-

vention of Attorney General Robert Kennedy, failed to produce a settlement.

The AATU, which is the governing body of amateur athletics in the United States, is organized by the various international federations as the clearing house for the Olympic and Pan-American Games and other international events.

The NCAA, comprising 600 major colleges, insists that since it provides a big portion of the talent for these events, it should have the dominant voice in the conduct of the affairs.

## USPGA Rejects Hogan's Offer

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — The United States Professional Golfers Association has turned down Ben Hogan's bid for a \$200,000 tournament here early in May, the Fort Worth golfing memorial said Monday.

It would have been the richest event in golf history if the PGA had accepted the tournament on its schedule on dates previously assigned the Colonial national invitation.

The national golf group is reported to have feared the event would detract from the PGA tournament in Dallas, Tex., July 18-21. The Hogan tournament would have been played May 9-12.

The winner was to have received \$100,000. Hogan said, payable in a lump sum or over a 10-year period.
