EVANGELISTIC SERVICES.—The evangelistic services under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. of this city, opened most successfully yesterday at 3.45 by a public meeting in Zion Church. The audience room was packed to its utmost capacity, chairs being placed in the aisles to accommodate the congregation. A very spirited song service under the leadership of Mr. Greenwood, of Boston, was followed by prayer by the Rev. G. M. Campbell. Mr. Greenwood sang very affectively a solo, "All of Christ and None of Self," after which Mr. Gale spoke for about twenty minutes on the words, "The Hour is Come," showing that the hour had come for their services, for prayer, for quiet work, for God. He stated that his services had in view first the lifting of the church members to a higher plane, and then the salvation of the unconverted. The address was full of the quiet influence of the Holy Spirit, and was well spoken of at the close. Mr. Gale laid down a few rules which he said it was his purpose to follow out. First, the time would be strictly adhered to, to the minute; secondly the doors would be closed during the prayer, the solo, and the address, hence persons coming late would not be admitted until the singing of the full choir. This hint should be sufficient to bring the people on time. The service at 8.15 was again largely attended and the address on "Woe to them that are at ease in Zion" was full of power and effect.

SOURIS NOTES.

The Rev. A. E. McPhee, Baptist, Kingsborough, preached in the Presbyterian Church last Sunday evening, Pastor McKay being absent, having gone to Mt. Stewart to assist in dispensing the Lord's Supper there.

The Presbyterian Church has been recently furnished with a hot air furnace. W. Mellet had the contract. The old heaters, stoves and stovepipes, have been laid aside for the more modern means of heating. The Church of England, St. Albans, has lately received attention at the hands of the painters. A coat of white paint with brown trimmings, adds much to its appearance.

The steam sawmill that has been running in the eastern part of the village for some time back under the management of a local company, has been removed to New Harmony, where it is being re-erected near the brook that skirts the northern boundary of the estate of the late Edward Fitzpatrick.

The mackerel fleet ran to Souris for shelter, where they remained in safety till the wind abated. With the exception of a few good catches along the north side over a fortnight ago, mackerel fishing has been a failure around here thus far this season. The next few days, however, may bring better luck.

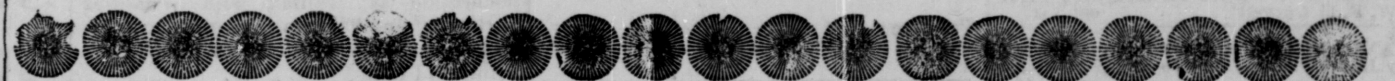
