

Canadian Steel Users Weather Strike's Ills

Canadian steel users, helped in many cases by precautionary stockpiling, have so far weathered 22 days of the United States steel strike with remarkably little trouble. But there are signs that some will start feeling the pinch soon.

Shortages may start developing in some fields in one or two weeks, a Canadian Press survey finds. The squeeze will get more severe after that if the strike continues.

And a prolonged strike will have a delayed-action effect on steel started construction projects by requiring them to wait for the post-strike steel supplies. Canada relies on the U.S. for much of its requirements in heavy structural steels.

However, there are no reports of current construction jobs being delayed. One Montreal structural steel firm reports it has enough steel to last until next February.

EXPANDED CAPACITY

Besides the stockpiling, which began long before the strike started on midnight, July 14, the Canadian situation has been helped by the expansion in Canadian steel-making capacity during the last two years—the second and third weeks of the strike. Steel mills now operating at 85.5 per cent of rated capacity last week.

No official explanation has been given for this. The reason may lie in heavy stockpiling that has been done—the U.S. strike was anticipated a long time ago. Also there may be local reasons, such as the shutting down of a blast furnace for retining at the Steel Company of Canada. The furnace with a capacity of 1,000 tons daily, is expected to resume production around mid-September.

There has been no sign of Canadian mills taking advantage of the strike by getting U.S. orders for steel. Federal government officials said Canadian mills likely will try to look after their own customers.

Navy Seizes Rocky Island

LONDON (AP) — The Royal Navy has taken back into the British Empire an uninhabited, 3-foot wide islet in the North Atlantic.

Rockall—which no other nation apparently wanted or perhaps even knew about—was seized as crown property four years ago as no other nation could use it for observing British guided missile activities.

Its a barren place—strictly for the birds—rising 70 feet out of the ocean some 200 miles off Scotland's Hebrides Islands.

When the destroyer Cavendish made a recent stop at Rockall, a landing party couldn't find the metal plaque or the union jack installed on the island when it was first taken over.

The Cavendish landing party effected re-annexation of Rockall by planting another flag and installing another plaque.

Justice Minister To Visit Berlin

OTTAWA (CP) — Justice Minister Fulton, Commons Speaker Roland Michener and three other members of Parliament will visit West Germany and Berlin Sept. 2-7, it was announced Tuesday.

The German Embassy said the five-man Canadian delegation has been invited to Germany by Dr. Eugen Gerstenmaier, president of the German Parliament in Bonn.

Other members of the delegation are John C. Pallett, Progressive Conservative MP for Peel; Oscar Williams, Conservative MP for Waterloo North; and James Chevrier, Liberal MP for General Laurier.

The main reason for the trip is to attend the inauguration ceremony for Dr. Heinrich Lübke, new president of the federal republic of Germany who will be sworn in at a special session of the Bundestag Sept. 15.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Partner bids One Spade, next player passes, both sides vulnerable. What would you now bid with each of the following five hands?

- ♠ A8 ♣ A78 ♣ 9764 ♠ QJ982
- ♠ KJ72 ♠ A964 ♠ 7953 ♠ 47
- ♠ A76 ♠ 542 ♠ A9876 ♠ 43
- ♠ Q ♠ Q753 ♠ J6 ♠ AKJ84
- ♠ 9853 ♠ 84 ♠ AK752 ♠ Q3

1. One notrump. The only two bids to consider are one notrump and two clubs. A one notrump response indicates a balanced hand which contains 6 to 9 high-card points. The bid is not forcing. The opening bidder may pass.

A two club response generally shows 10 to 16 points. Being a new suit named by responder, the opener is forced to bid again.

This relatively poor hand does not justify compelling the opener to bid again. Hence the opening bid of one notrump is not made. It is true that the notrump response is not completely accurate distributionally, since the hand contains a singleton, but it comes closer to representing the values held.

2. Three spades. The double raise is forcing to game. It shows approximately the strength of an opening bid. The point value is usually 13 to 15. Although high points, the hand easily makes the grade as a double raise when the good trump fit and the singleton club are evaluated. There is not much point to

responding two hearts with only a four-card suit. An eventual game contract in spades is indicated and partner should be so informed without unnecessary trills.

3. Two spades. This shows 6 to 9 points including adequate trump support. The two diamond bid is avoided because of the risk of being faced with a two spade rebid by the opener, in which case it would become difficult to know whether to pass or bid three spades. By bidding two spades directly, the decision of whether or not there is a game is placed where it belongs—in the lap of the opening bidder.

4. Two hearts. This follows the general principle of bidding the higher ranking of two five-card suits, regardless of strength in the suits. To bid clubs first and then follow with hearts would indicate to partner that the hearts were only four long, and might result in missing a game or slam in hearts.

5. Two diamonds. What we have here are the values for a two and a half spade bid. The 9 high-card points are supplemented by four trumps, two doubletons, and a good five card suit. The intention is to raise spades at the next opportunity. This will give partner a chance to stop under game if he has only a minimum opening bid. A two spade response would be an underbid; a three spade response would be an overbid.

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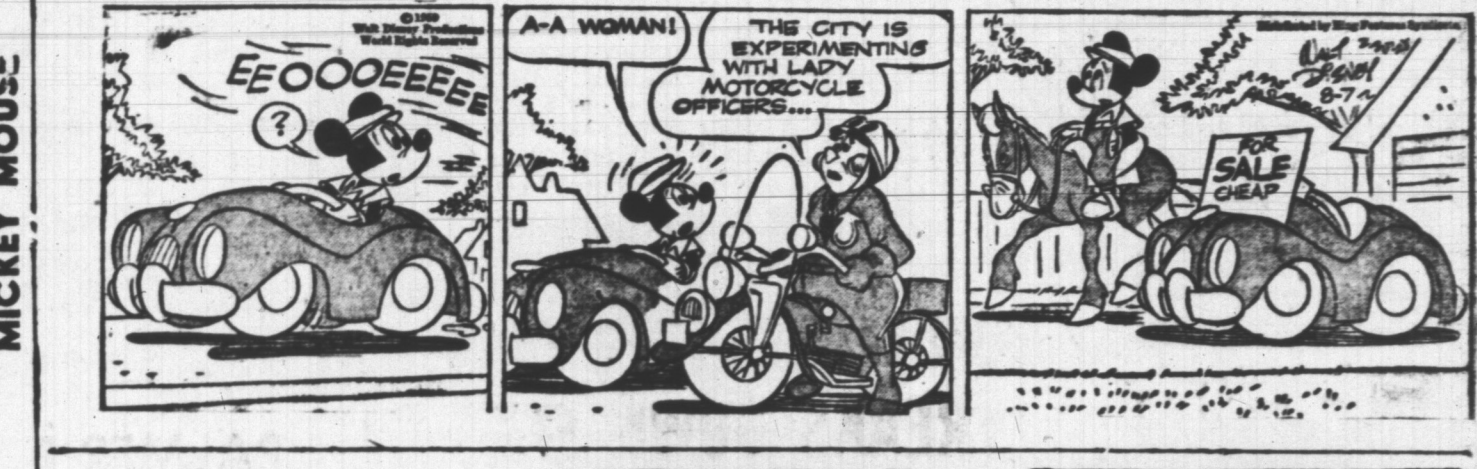
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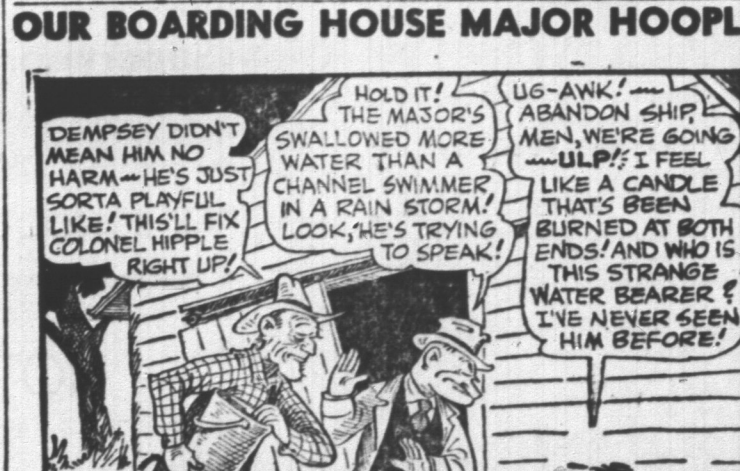

MARCH TO HIROSHIMA (Reuters) — A big procession to protest against nuclear weapons moved Tuesday on Hiroshima — site of war's first atomic blast. An estimated 3,000,000 Japanese have taken part in the march, which started 55 days ago and will conclude today in Hiroshima Peace Park for the fifth world convention against nuclear weapons. Fourteen years ago next Tuesday, a U.S. bomber dropped a single atomic bomb over Hiroshima, killing more than 60,000 persons and destroying more than four square miles of the city.

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
