NOVA SCOTIA'S BIG EXHIBITION

Brow's Guernseys Capture Many Prizes.

OTHER ISLAND EXHIBITORS ALSO DO VERY WELL.

HALIFAX, Sept. 27.—The highest number of entries in any one class of cattle, excepting Ayrshires, is in the class for Guernseys. In the latter class Mr. E. R. Brow, of Charlottetown, did exceptionally well. He secured first prize for aged bull, first for bull calf over six months, first for bull calf under six months, first second and third for aged cows, second and third for three year old cow, first for two year old heifer, first for yearling heifer, first for heifer over six months, first and third for heifer under six months, first for aged herd, first for young herd and for sweepstakes female any age.

HALIFAX, Sept. 26.—The attendance at the Nova Scotia Exhibition is very large, and great interest is being taken in the proceedings. Island exhibits are attracting much attention and it is apparent that considerable prize-money will find its way to the Garden Province. In the classes already judged Island exhibitors have been awarded prizes as follows:—

George Chilton, Charlottetown, took first prize for lettuce, curly; collection of gladiolus; col. grasses; six gladiolus spikes; six pansies; second prize for long blood beet; lima beans; winter cabbage, pot herbs, summer radishes, white turnips; collection pansies, collection phlox drummondii, collection annuals, bouquet, six sweet peas.

F. G. Boyver, Georgetown Royalty, took first prize for bull, 3 years; bull calf, under 1 year; bull, any age; heifer calf, under 6 mos; breeder's young herd of 1 bull and 4 females under 2 years; best bull, any age; second prize for heifer, 2 years; bull calf, under 6 mos; best herd of 1 bull and 4 females, any age; third prize for cow, 4 years and over. All shortborns.

Senator Ferguson in his exhibit of Galloways captured all the prizes: Bull, 3 years and 1 year; bull calf, 1 year; bull calf, 6 months; cow, 4 years, 3 years, and 6 months; bull, any age; female, any age; herd, bull and four females; breeder's young herd.

P. J. McKinnon, of Charlottetown, took first prize for pot herbs, summer radishes; collection pansies; collection annuals, bouquet dried flowers; second prize for pair of fowls, dressed; beet turnip, blood; cauliflower, 3 heads; cauliflower, best head; celery, lettuce; collection zinnias, collection grasses, six gladiolus spikes, six pansies, 6 carnations, bouquet, (amateur); third prize for collection gladiolus, lima beans, green podded lima beans.

G. H. Hazard, Charlottetown, took first prize for collection dahlias, collection sweet peas, collection lilium spikes; six dahlias, pom-pom; six sweet peas; second prize for six dahlias, cactus; six dahlias, show.

Albert Boswall, Pownal, took 2nd prize for bull calf under 1 year.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 27.—Charles Reardon, son of Thomas Reardon, of this city, died at Montreal yesterday. He was on his way home when taken ill.

Russia's Hatred Shown.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 26.—Believing that war between Great Britain and the Transvaal is imminent, most of the Russian newspapers make no attempt to conceal their sympathy with the Boers.

The Novoe Vremya raises the question of the maintenance of the Suez Canal as an international waterway, if the whole of East Africa, from Cairo to the Cape of Good Hope, is to be formed into a compact British colony.

The Novosti comments in bitter terms upon "England's grab policy," and warns her that the war would not be a triumphal march.

Captured a U. S. Gunboat.

MANILA, Sept. 25.—It is reported that the insurgents have captured the United States gunboat *Urdaneta*, in the Arani river, on the northwest side of Arlaba, where she was patrolling. The United States gunboat *Petrel* was sent to investigate and has returned here, having discovered the *Urdaneta* beached opposite the town of Orani, on the Orani river. She had been riddled with bullets and burned and the following guns, with their ammunition had been captured: a one pounder, one Colt automatic gun and one Nordenfeldt 25 millimetre gun. The crew of the *Urdaneta* are prisoners or have been killed. Further details are lacking.

The Trouble at Springhill.

AMHERST, Sept. 25.—There is no change this morning in the state of affairs at Springhill. Over 500 men are now idle and the refusal of the management to recognize the miners' committee has put a serious aspect on affairs. Notice has been posted by the management that the travelling rakes will be put on No. 3 slope at 3.30, but asking that No. 3 slope time be left to arbitration. This is not satisfactory to the men.

A Report Denied.

LONDON, Sept. 26.—The Times publishes the following despatch from Simla: "It is persistently rumored here that Abdurrahman Khan, ameer of Afghanistan, is dead, and that a war of succession has already begun. So far as the Indian government is aware, the report is absolutely unfounded."

A Victim of Football.

MERIDEN, Conn., Sept. 25.—Thomas Kelly, aged 17, a member of the Middletown High School team, died at the city hospital tonight from injuries received in a football game with the Meriden High School last Saturday. He sustained a concussion of the spine.

Lease of Delagoa Bay.

LORENZO MARQUES, Delagoa Bay, Sept. 25.—The Governor of Lorenzo Marques asserts that he has no information regarding the reported lease of Delagoa Bay by Portugal to Great Britain.

Bled to Death.

DIGBY, Sept. 25.—A sad death occurred in the suburban village of Roseway yesterday. Kenneth Hatfield, a young man 21 years of age, bled to death. He was getting his yoke of oxen ready for the day's work, when he commenced bleeding at the nose and before an hour passed away he was dead. The circumstances attending the case are extremely sad. He was the eldest of a large family of children who were keeping house themselves, their mother being dead and the father, Bazael Hatfield, at sea.

The Transvaal Trouble.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—Officials of the foreign office gave out this evening the text of a letter to the secretary of state for the colonies in the British high commissioner in South Africa, dated Sept. 22. The British reply expressed regret that Her Majesty's offer No. 5 of Sept. 8 had been refused and declines to renew the discussion on the old lines. In a later communication, dated Sept. 22, the Imperial Government takes up the charge of breach of faith insinuated by Secretary of State Reitz, Sept. 1, 6 "which," is pointed out, "we cannot pass over in silence."

New British Battleship.

PLYMOUTH, Eng., Sept. 25.—The British battleship *London* was successfully launched here today in the presence of large crowds of people. Her displacement is 15,000 tons. The main feature of her construction is the armour belt, which is carried the entire length of the ship.

The Alaskan Boundary.
