Auto Big Three Top Advertising In The U.S.A.

NEW YORK (AP) — The auto industry's big three topped the advertising field in United States newspapers in 1957, says the Bureau of Advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers Association.

It was the fifth straight year in which General Motors, Ford and Chrysler ranked in that order as leading advertisers.

General Motors' total of \$22,390,206 was a drop of 2.6 per cent from 1956. Ford spent \$13,533,144, a jump of 24.3 per cent over the year before. Chrysler's \$26,144,287 was 45.7 per cent higher than in 1956.

Others in the top ten, in order, were: Lever Bros. Co., Distillers Corp., Seagram's Ltd., Colgate - Palmolive Co., National Distillers and Chem. I Corp., Shenley Industries Inc., Prechter and Gamble Co., General Foods Corp.

Total advertising in U.S. newspapers was \$757,201,000. With production costs added, the total was \$810,000,000, up 2.6 per cent from 1956.

MORE CANADIAN AID

COLOMBO, Ceylon (Reuters)—Two more Canadian diesel locomotives have been given to Ceylon under the Colombo Plan. They were formally handed over to Ceylon Wednesday and bring to 10 the total number of engines so far given by Canada to Ceylon. Value of the locomotives is estimated at 8,000,000 rupees (\$1,650,000).

UP And INS Consolidated In New News Organization

NEW YORK (AP) — United Press Associations and the International News Service Saturday announced a consolidation to form a new service called United Press International.

A joint statement said the consolidation agreement was signed May 16 but that a public announcement was delayed to permit formation of plans for the physical changeover.

The merger brought to an end more than 50 years of three-way competition in the news field among The Associated Press, oldest of the three, and the UP and INS.

Frank H. Bartholomew, UP president and general manager who was named president of the new organization, issued a statement saying in part:

"Economics was an important factor in the creation of the great new news network. Costs of covering the world's newsfronts have risen steadily with rapidly improving means of transmitting both news and pictures by leased wire and electronic processes."

Bartholomew also said that the consolidation "will assure a stronger competitive news and pictorial news report to newspapers, radio and television stations throughout the civilized world."

Shortly after the merger was made public, Victor Hanse, assistant U.S. attorney-general in charge of the anti-trust department, said in Washington he planned a check to determine whether there was any conflict with anti-trust laws.

Hansen said he had reached no conclusion as to whether the Clayton Anti-Trust Act applied to the situation but he said it seemed to apply.

The United Press International consolidation included the still picture services of both former organizations. The merger statement did not mention the motion picture services operated for television by the two concerns, but a spokesman for INS said these were not included.

Earl J. Johnson, vice-president and general news manager of the UP, announced that key personnel of INS will be retained and will reinforce the present UP staff. He did not state the number to be retained. The INS is reported to have some 400 employees.
