In the outgoing Parliament, Karamanlis party - formerly known as the Greek Rally - had 214 of the 300 seats.

The Communist groups in the coalition demanded that Greece pull out of NATO and that American advisory missions leave Greece.

U. S. Ban On Tanks To Saudi Arabia Lifted

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Eisenhower Saturday night lifted the embargo which for two days had blocked the delivery of 18 light reconnaissance tanks to Saudi Arabia.

By cancelling the ban on licensed arms shipments to the troubled Middle East, Eisenhower also permitted export of \$100,000 worth of automotive and aircraft parts and other articles to Israel.

The president, who is in Georgia acted after officials held a series of day-long conferences in the state department. An official statement declared that after study it was decided the shipment of the tanks and other articles would be in line with United States policies of promoting the peace and defensive strength of Israel and the Arab states.

It was understood that an influential element in the decision was the desire of the president and his advisers to maintain good relations with Saudi Arabia with which the United States must soon negotiate for renewal of Dharan air base rights expiring in June. Saudi Arabia has been courted by the Soviet Union for months and the Soviets are reported to have offered to sell arms to that country. Saudi Arabia is also the centre of vast oil deposits exploited by United States companies.

NO ARMS UPSET - Officials also contended that the 18 tanks in the hands of Saudi Arabia would not upset the balance between the Arab states and Israel, with which Saudi Arabia has no common border.

The Saudi Arabian embassy obviously was pleased by Saturday night's action. A spokesman said "State department press officer Lincoln White said that the latest decision had no bearing on Israel's pending request for \$50,000,000 worth of arms."

COALITION HAS EDGE - Most political experts conceded the bizarre lineup of politicians determined to oust Karamanlis at any cost had an edge in the voting. It also was conceded that the victors likely would win by a narrow margin, which would not make for a stable government.

The opposition coalition, called the Democratic Union, is composed of a seven-party group linking Moscow-liners and three anti-Communist former premiers. This aggregation had to win at least 151 seats to wrest control of the 300-member Parliament from Karamanlis' Radical Union. In the outgoing Parliament, Karamanlis party - formerly known as the Greek Rally - had 214 of the 300 seats.

The Communist groups in the coalition demanded that Greece pull out of NATO and that American advisory missions leave Greece.

U. S. Ban On Tanks To Saudi Arabia Lifted
