A RESIDENT of the district reports that the West River Bridge is at present in a most disgraceful condition. It appears that the contract to repair the bridge sold by public auction to a Conservative on March 30th last was taken from the contractor and the work was given to a party who attended at the sale and who, needless to say, is a grit. This person placed five men to work, whom three would have been far more serviceable, and the result now is that the bridge is almost impassable. The planking laid down was not spiked in place, and there are holes in the bridge which are dangerous to the extreme to the travelling public. To crown all, planking the property of private individuals in the vicinity, was taken and roughly thrown over the broken places, making an accident much more probable than had the holes been left open. For all this Hon. D. Farquharson, who seems to have control of the Public Works Department, is the responsible party. Perhaps this is the mode of retrenchment marked out by the grits of our fair Province.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, July 27. An order in Council has been passed appointing Lewis Coste Chief Engineer of Public Works.

R. Y. Hebdien, of Montreal, whose wife eloped with Jack Allan a few weeks ago, is applying for divorce.

Mr. Courtney, Deputy Minister of Finance, has just returned from England, where he successfully floated a new loan. He says that Canadian credit never stood higher in Britain than it does to-day.

Minister Haggart, accompanied by Mr. Schreiber, Dr. Montague, M. P., and Mr. Brown, a mechanical expert of Toronto, left yesterday for a tour inspection over the Intercolonial.

News From St. John's, Nfld. St. John's, Nfld., July 27.

The Canadian-made safes continue to prove their quality and show splendid conditions and results after the severe tests to which they have been put. The work of rebuilding goes steadily on. The destitute are all now temporarily housed.

Anarchist Arrested. PITTSBURG, Pa., July 27. The police have arrested Henry Bauer, the head centre of the Anarchists of this region. It is stated that a warrant is out for the arrest of Herr Most.

Cricket. HALIFAX, July 27. The Philadelphia cricketers again defeated the Wanderers in one innings and 33 runs.

Prostrated by Heat. NEW YORK, July 27. The heat is almost unbearable in this city. Many cases of prostration are reported.

General Telegraphic News. QUEBEC, July 25.—This morning smugglers Boyard and Lanry were expected to appear at the police court, but the authorities did not bring them up. The prisoners' lawyers, Fitzgerald and Charles Langelier, however, were present, but were unable to do anything in their behalf until the Government's intentions were known. It was subsequently learned that the Government lawyer, Panet Angers, had been wired instructions from Ottawa to appear and prosecute, and to resist all applications for bail until the witnesses from below had come up to be heard. Panet Angers, however, being confined to his house by indisposition, did not appear. An arrangement was made to postpone the case until 2:30 this afternoon. The motion to discharge the prisoners was refused, and the case postponed.

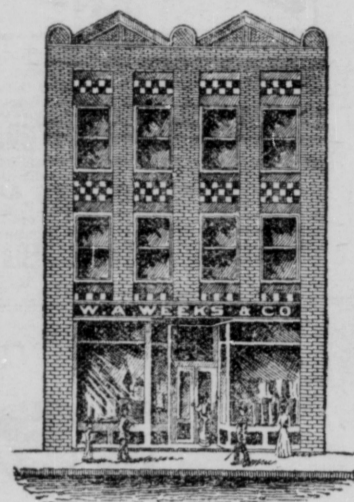
LONDON, July 25.—At a meeting of the board of directors of the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada, it was decided that Sir Henry Tyler, president, and Mr. Howard, the new director and vice-president of the English board, of the Great North Western Railway, proceed to Canada about the middle of August to examine thoroughly into the working of the entire system. They will be accompanied on their tour of inspection by several leading American and Canadian railway experts. The principal object of the visit of Sir Henry and Mr. Hubbard is to reduce materially the working expenses of the railway, especially in the pay and working departments. The board decided that expenses must be reduced to the lowest reasonable point.

NEW YORK, July 25.—The board of walking delegates struck their greatest blow to-day against the Iron League and Building Material Dealers' Association, when general strikes on the Waldorf hotel and the new Netherland hotel were ordered. Over 1700 men quit work in a body. The cause of the strike was the employment of non-union men to handle building material and non-union cartmen to haul it.

HALIFAX, July 25.—Canada President Van Horne, Vice-President Shaughnessy and Director Angus had an interview with the committee of the City Council and Board of Trade to-day in regard to additional terminal facilities at Halifax. As before explained, Halifax is in absolute need of additional terminal facilities, but opinion differs as to what it shall be, the City Council favoring a central depot and the Board of Trade an extension along the wharves. The question was semi-officially referred to Messrs. Van Horne and Shaughnessy as railway experts for an independent opinion, purely from a railway point of view. Without expressing any opinion on the question to-day, Mr. Van Horne said he had looked on the situation pretty fully from what would be his standpoint were he managing the Intercolonial, without any regard to local opinion or influence. He had looked over the ground from the standpoint of local as well as foreign freight requirements. Regarding the extension along the water front, Mr. Van Horne incidentally remarked that he had never known a case of a railway being extended along a water front without increase to the value of that water front of from 100 to 5,000 per cent. and he would be very much surprised if Halifax wharf owners stood in their own light for any length of time in view of that fact, by refusing to bring their water and railway facilities together. In the afternoon, Messrs. Van Horne, Shaughnessy, Angus, Messrs. Kenny and Sears, M. P's., and others were given a delightful excursion on Bedford Basin. The party proceeded to Cape Breton to-morrow morning and upon their return will take a trip down through the land of Evangeline.
