Jury Duty For Women Supported By CWL Third Regional Fall Conference

Some 200 representatives, including the directors and honorary members, of all 18 parish councils in Queen's County were in attendance at the CWL Third Regional Conference held at Mt. St. Mary's (Motherhouse of the Sisters of St. Martha in Sherwood on Sunday afternoon and evening. This was the third and concluding one of the Regional Conferences held each fall under the sponsorship of the provincial council of the CWL. The other two were held in Montague and Summerside on October 31st and November 7th.

Mrs. Fred L. MacMillan of Charlottetown, the provincial president, chaired both the afternoon and evening sessions, and gave the highlights of the national convention held in Jasper early in September. The meeting opened with the League prayer led by Very Rev. George MacCormack of St. Andrew's the provincial director, who also made comments with regard to the national meetings.

Members of St. Pius X Council of Parkdale were the hostesses for this Conference to which the delegates were welcomed by the director, Rt. Rev. Msgr. P. MacDonald, and the president Mrs. R. J. MacCarville.

Rev. Mother Mary Angela, Superior General of the Congregation of St. Martha, extended greetings to the CWL members on behalf of the Sisters of the Motherhouse.

The conference went on record in support of Jury Duty for Women as did the two previous meetings. As the result, it was agreed that the days for the provincial convention be changed to Saturday and Sunday, rather than Sunday and Monday. Other matters discussed and referred to the provincial executive for final decisions included plans for the continuation of CWL sponsored TV programs for the coming winter, and a brief proposed by the provincial Mental Health Association.

Helpful hints for treasurers were given by Mrs. A. F. Gormley of Parkdale who is the provincial CWL treasurer.

Rev. Owen Sharkey, of St. Dunstan's University, director of the Catholic Girls' Scholarship Association, reviewed the history of this organization, and made an urgent appeal to all parishes to double their previous contributions in order to meet the scholarship requirements for the greatly increased number of applications being received.

Mass was celebrated in the chapel at Mt. St. Mary's at 5 by Rev. Owen Sharkey, Members of the hostess parish council, St. Pius X of Parkdale, served refreshments during the supper hour.

Iphigene Arseneault, of Charlottetown, provincial chairman of the CWL Centennial Project support for "The Vanier Institute of the Family" reported that to date all but seven of the 51 parish councils in the diocese have sent in contributions amounting to \$3,300, including donations received from families in Mt. Carmel and Egmont Bay where there are no CWL parish councils. Miss Arseneault congratulated the parishes on the splendid response and expressed the hope that the CWL in P. E. I. would be the first of the provincial organizations to reach its share of the objective of \$100,000 being sought for this project by the CWL across Canada.

Rhodesian Currency Under Ban

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP)—Commercial banks in South Africa has suspended all dealings in Rhodesian currency.

Economists termed the move a crisis in financial and economic relations between the two countries.

A spokesman for the banks said the suspension is a "temporary precaution" until the Rhodesian situation is clarified. But press reports said already there are signs of a serious situation developing.

OTTAWA (CP)—Steel production amounted to 193,204 tons last week, a decline of about half of one per cent from the

previous week, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported.

It said its index of steel production, based on average weekly output during 1957-59 equalling 100, was 201 last week and 202 a week earlier. A year ago it was 176.
