Seek To Halt Spread of 'Flu

With 27 members of Holman's Summerside staff of 200 down with influenza yesterday, the forces of science were called into play in an endeavour to combat the spreading epidemic. Large numbers of the remaining members of the staff paraded over to the office of Dr. Austin Delaney where they were inoculated with an anti-flu vaccine.

The firm paid the cost of the injections and encouraged all the employees to take advantage of the opportunity. The available supply of vaccine ran out before all those who desired the treatment could receive it. This inoculation is supposed to set up an immunity to the influenza virus in fifty percent of the people who take it.

Yesterday the number of absences through sickness had reached a new high, and this applied to all business houses. However, the situation in the schools was no worse and no plans were afoot to have the schools closed. Between 15 and 20 percent of the pupils are home with 'flu. Three teachers in the High School were also ill yesterday.—S
