TIMELY NOTES ON TOPICS CONNECTED WITH Silver Fox Farming

To do their marketing ranchers may employ an available fieldman who will be furnished with a suitable marking outfit; they may employ any other person to do it for them or they may do it themselves. In every case the Standard equipment must be used. This equipment may be ordered from the Ketchum Mfg. Co., Ottawa, Canada.
Each pup should be marked in the right ear with the owner's registered tattoo letters and in the left ear with the letter "P" which is the 1936 year letter. A number precedes the letter "P" and this properly done makes the identification complete.
All pups are required to be marked by August 15th, but many ranchers mark their young foxes when they are only two months old which gives them some early protection against theft.

The silver fox auctions seem fated to run into a sea of troubles, as almost every auction for the past year has coincided with some upheaval, political or military. Every-

one had been looking forward to an excellent June sale. They had reason to expect it because of the many transactions which have taken place since March by private treaty, whereby some 20,000 skins have been sold. With a total offering of 44,000 skins for the first houses it was believed the whole lot would be pretty well cleaned up, and lo and behold, the new Socialistic government in France is followed by wholesale strikes which tied up the manufacturing and business portions of Paris and many of the great outlying cities. In fact they almost led to a disruption of trade. It was not only the effect on France, it made other continental cities nervous and apprehensive and this accounts for the lack of attendance of buyers from France and other nearby countries on Monday and succeeding days in London.

The Hudson's Bay Company offering of 8,500 skins was disposed of to the extent of a few over 4,000, and for the good colored ones, particularly those capable of being made into scarves, an actual advance of seven and one-half per cent to thirteen per cent was made. On the other hand faded skins and those lacking desirable qualities were somewhat neglected. Other auctions following Hudson's Bay were not so fortunate, and O. M. Lamson and Company reduced their offering to 26 per cent of the total skins on hand. Fifty per cent of these were sold at firm prices with advances registered for the best qualities.

Mr. Peter G. Clark of the P. E. I. Fur Pool was telephoned as to his observations on the pet situation and he said that his European representative had cabled that as soon as the political situation in France becomes stabilized, there will be an active demand from the trade there for silver fox skins. The fact that the offering has been reduced so considerably since March is evidence of a steady consumption of the product.

Recently the P. E. I. Fur Pool have disposed of good colored skins that have fetched as high as \$140, and they will continue selling by private treaty next week. "Private treaty sales," said Mr. Clark, "have been exceptionally successful with us. In one week recently we disposed of over 500 skins in that manner and we realized our limits too. I have every confidence that the remainder of our consignments will be disposed of ere fall at satisfactory prices."

Drs. W. H. Brown and George O. Burr of the University of Minnesota, have made a study of fats and state that they are almost as important in the diet as vitamins. One fatty acid, Linolic, derived from corn and linseed oil, is so potent that a half drop of it daily has

maintained the life span in a dog, the rat, fat deficiency they say results in premature cessation of growth and early death. Dr. A. E. Hansen of the same University, finds that fat deficiency may be the cause of infantile eczema. When olive oil, corn oil, raw linseed oil and lard were added to the diets improvement followed.

Alfred Fraser, Inc. American representatives of O. M. Lamson and Co. London, and Frederick Huth and Co. of New York, have combined. Alfred Fraser, well-known in this province, is President and J. M. Bossac, formerly manager of Frederick Huth and Co., is Executive Vice-President and General Manager.

Fromm Bros. Inc., largest breeders of silver foxes in the world, had a full page ad in Vogue magazine of May first and fifteenth. They have contracted for twenty-two more. The copy is designed to acquaint the consuming public with the Frumm trade marks and incidentally popularize silver foxes. Leading designers from Paris and America will design special garments for these ads and following the appearance of the ads Frumm Bros. will distribute reprints and posters to the entire fur retailing trade of the United States. Pedigree certificates and a Frumm Medalion will be attached to each pelt.

The Hudson's Bay Company reports that over a period of more than 100 years there seems to be a nine or ten year cycle in the number of fur bearing animals including muskrats, mink and red fox. The periodic increase of these and other animals appears to hold true in the northern United States, as well as in the Canadian North West. The increase starts in the far north and gradually travels southward, but the period remains the same.

The wife of the President of Cuba, Madam Gomez, purchased a magnificent silver fox cape on a recent trip to New York. It was made in narrow vertical panels of dipped hem line design. The fur was manipulated so as to create a highly decorative oval point back yoke. A pair of silver fox skins were presented by the makers of the cape to Madam Gomez.

Four hundred and ninety-two blue fox skins were sold at the last auction that is commingly held in Saint Louis for the account of the United States government. The average of \$30.11 represents an advance of 46 per cent.

cost of disinfectant used is balanced by the freedom from trouble and expense of having to deal with fleas on the foxes.

Dr. Alex Hrdlička of the United States Academy of Sciences, who has spent three and a half years on Kodiak Island, off the coast of Alaska, in an effort to trace the origin of the earliest man on the North American continent, states that he has definitely proved that the ancient inhabitants of the Kodiak Island domesticated the fox more than 2,000 years before the arrival of the white man in Alaska.

The Arnold Liebes Fur Company of San Francisco, California, brought in the first offering of European ranch bred silver foxes ever marketed in the United States. The collection was advertised extensively by them in California newspapers last May, the ad copy describing the collection as "the finest in the world" and followed by saying that "Norwegian silver foxes have a softness of texture and brightness of silver that is not approached by those from any part of the world."

Gill "Macbeth," and Rookwell Kent "Hamlet." Artists chosen from European and American representatives will illustrate the other volumes. The printing will be done at the Oxford University Press in England.

The three artists, Rackham, Gill and Kent are singularly fitted to illustrate the Shakespearean volumes mentioned. Rackham's weirdly beautiful drawings seem to depict the very spirit of fairy. Eric Gill's book adornments so far have been almost entirely by means of the wood-block of which his "Cantabrigia Tales" and "Four Gospels" engravings have become very famous. His work is often characterized by a novel mingling of wood-engraving and type. Rookwell Kent also illustrates with wood-engravings of an austere power appropriate to an interpretation of "Hamlet."

The following interesting paragraph appeared recently in the New York Times—"What is announced as the first extensive catalogue ever printed of first editions of American songs has just been issued by the rare book department of the Scribner Book Store.

The Toronto Saturday Night calls the attention of Canadian music lovers, and particularly those who expect to attend the Bayreuth Wagner Festivals this summer, to the publication of "Germany and the 1936 Bayreuth Festival" by the Tourist Information Department in Berlin. The volume is to be distributed free by the German State Railways Information Office, Toronto. The cover is done in colour and was designed by the well-known Berlin artist, Jupp Wertz. The book contains pictures of recent Bayreuth Music Festivals, a description of this year's Wagner Festival, and information concerning the various performances, the artists who will take part, prices of tickets, railway rates, hotel accommodations, and suggestions for excursions in the vicinity.

The first half of the Festival will be from July 19th to 30th, and the second half from August 18 to 31st. The purpose of this division is to enable those who wish to attend the Olympic Games in Berlin, to hear the Bayreuth Wagner operas either before or after the Olympics.
