OTTAWA, (CP)—The front row on Government and Opposition sides of the House of Commons will include 18 new faces at the session of Parliament opening Thursday.

The seating arrangement for the session was disclosed by Lt.-Col. W. J. Franklin, sergeant-at-arms, after consultations with all parties in the House.

The new Members with front-row seats include Transport Minister Chevrier and Health Minister Martin. Last session they sat in the second row of the block of 21 seats reserved for the cabinet in the centre of the chamber to the speaker's right.

Other Ministers

Other ministers in the front row are Labor Minister Gregg, Justice Minister Garson, Agriculture Minister Gardiner, Prime Minister St. Laurent, Trade Minister Howe, Finance Minister Abbott, Defence Minister Claxton, External Affairs Minister Pearson and Postmaster General Cole.

Ministers in the second row are Resources Minister Lesage, Fisheries Minister Sinclair, Mines Minister Prudham, Works Minister Winters, Citizenship Minister Harris, Revenue Minister McCann, Veterans Affairs Minister Lapointe, Associate Defence Minister Campney, and Secretary of State Pickersill.

W. G. Weir, parliamentary assistant to the prime minister and Liberal whip at the last Parliament, is also seated in the cabinet block. He is expected to be re-appointed whip.
