ISLAND LADY'S DEATH.—The death is announced at Gloucester Mass., of Mrs. Matilda Beaton, wife of Captain Beaton, at the age of 57 years. The deceased was a daughter of the late Capt. Roderick McDonald, of Souris, in this Province, and had been a resident of Gloucester for the past thirty-three years. She leaves a husband, two sons and one daughter. She was of a kind and amiable disposition and was beloved by all who knew her. The funeral took place from St. Anne's Church, Gloucester, on Friday last, and was very largely attended. McLean's warehouse, Grafton Street. It was some time before it was known what the ringing meant, as it was thought from the first cause. The firemen arrived after a while, but in the meantime the fire was effectually stopped by the use of two Stemple Fire Extinguishers, kept for emergencies by Messrs. Doid & Rogers. The fire was on the lower floor, on the west wall, and was probably started from a stove on this floor. The wall was considerably charred, but little damage was done. A slight dash of water was put on it afterwards by the hose.
