No Recession Expected But Ottawa Ready Just In Case

By Harold Morrison (Canadian Press Staff Writer) OTTAWA, (CP) — The government is convinced that Canada's economy will continue its postwar growth this year, but its advisers have carefully mapped out means of fighting a recession if it comes.

The strategy is to employ fully "built-in stabilizers," monetary and fiscal measures, public works projects, incentives to investment and even deficit financing in the drive to keep the economy buoyant, an official said Thursday.

"Built-in stabilizers" are such things as unemployment insurance, family allowances, and old-age and veterans pensions. These are providing an annual flow of about \$1,000,000,000 to Canadian consumers.

This minimum flow would be increased in the event of layoffs since more money would be coming out of the unemployment insurance fund.

Canada lacks these "stabilizers" at the time of the devastating world depression of the 1930's.

The government also has a backlog of public works programs, such as construction of post offices and customs houses, wharves and bridges. Work on these projects could be speeded up if community labor forces became idle.

A key to prosperity was the rate of capital investment, expected this year to match last year's record of \$5,600,000,000. If investment appeared to slacken, the government could provide new credits on corporations through accelerated depreciation and allowing industry to make bigger write-offs for income tax purposes.

Lastly, the government might even reverse its general policy, and go in for deficit financing, allowing the national debt, now about \$11,000,000,000, to increase slightly.

Officials emphasized, however, that the government has "no overall, grandiose blueprint" for fighting a recession. Canada was not a "socialist state" in which the government controls the economy. All the government would do was watch for soft spots and move in with weapons to strengthen the economic area.

Talk of recession developed among American economists, but Trade Minister Howe said recently he does not expect any recession, but rather another increase in the gross national product, sum total of all goods and services produced. The GNP hit an all-time high of \$24,200,000,000 in 1953.

IN MEMORIAM

STANLEY BALDWIN ORR Friends and relatives were shocked to hear of the passing of Stanley Orr in the General Hospital, Calgary, Alberta, on November 8, after being smitten with polio just six days before.

Stanley was born in New Glasgow July 7, 1927, son of Millar Orr and Hannah MacKenzie (the latter passed away when Stanley was two years old). Although he was never the rugged type, he attended school in Mayfield where he was a favorite, and later took a course at U.C.C., Charlottetown. He had an asthmatic condition, and was advised to go to Western Canada, which he did and found his health restored. He was employed by Swift Canadian Co. for a time, then returned home after two years only to find the asthma troubled him again. When he returned to Calgary he held a responsible position with the postal department as a letter carrier, which he served very efficiently until he became ill. His brother Leith (with whom he resided) had him admitted to the hospital where everything possible was done to relieve his suffering, and high hopes were held for his recovery, until two days before his passing.

Possessed with a kind and generous nature he made friends easily. While home he attended Church and Sunday school regularly. He leaves to mourn the loss of a loving son and brother, his father and stepmother (nee Ida Pursey) who was everything to a loving mother could be to him, three brothers, Leith in Calgary, Murray and Elbert in New Glasgow, to whom deepest sympathy is extended. His funeral, very largely attended, was held from the home of his parents on Nov. 15. Service was conducted by Rev. Howard Christie, assisted by Rev. W. Watterworth and Rev. Blaikie, who brought comforting messages. Mrs. George Dickleson was organist while the choir sang "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" and "Abide with Me No Night There" was sweetly rendered by Miss Doris Andrew.

KARACHI, Pakistan, (AP)—An condemned man in Karachi's central jail won a 11th-hour postponement of his execution Wednesday by invoking a law from the Koran. Moslem Bible, Mohammed's Juma was to have been hanged Wednesday for murdering his wife. He claimed successfully that relatives of his wife had forgiven him and that Koranic law provides condemned man cannot be hanged if so forgiven.

Earth Tremors Jolt Eastern Pennsylvania READING, Pa., (AP)—A series of nine earth tremors jolted this eastern Pennsylvania region early Thursday, tumbling sleepers out of bed, rattling chimneys and rattling houses. Rev. Joseph J. Lynch, seismologist at Fordham University in New York, termed them local "settling" shocks. He said their exact cause could not be determined.

Snow And Floods Hit Hard Blow At Western Europe LONDON, (AP)—Snow and floods hit Western Europe Thursday with dozens of Italian villages cut off, Germany covered with a white blanket, and even the usually sunny French Riviera shivering in freezing temperatures. "Northern Italy bore the brunt of the blizzard—its worst snowstorm in 15 years. Dozens of villages in the Italian Alps and Apennines were isolated. Drifts blocked highways. A textile mill collapsed under tons of snow near Pordenone but no one was hurt as the 350 employees had already gone home for the day. The Po River delta area was flooded, damaging large areas of rich farmland and inundating six small villages. Snow, rain, ice and freezing winds lashed Britain but in London, the weatherman played tricks, turning on bright sunshine after a night of sleet and snow. In Yugoslavia, railroads and highways are blocked by snow drifts. The Split-Zagreb express was snow-bound and snow plowing seven feet in Croatia forced cancellation of 24 trains. Some parts of Macedonia have been completely cut off for days.
