Though in 1949 and the first half of 1950 it appeared that the peak of the postwar inflation had passed, Communist aggression put a quick end to this brief breathing spell and inflationary pressures are now in the ascendancy to a degree unknown since the end of the war.

Today, the western nations are embarking on a large-scale program of preparedness with their economies already at or close to the state of full production. In marked contrast to 1939, there are no important reserves of idle workers and productive capacity which can be put to use to meet the extra demands.

Fundamentally, this is a good thing because it means that the economic structures, particularly of the United States and Canada, are much stronger and much healthier and therefore more able to bear additional burdens than in 1939.

The surplus capacity of 1939 was an indication of the lack of growth during the depression of economic weakness rather than of strength. Yet, though the real physical ability to shoulder the added load of defence preparations is much greater than in 1939, the lack of surplus capacity means that the problem of inflation is immediate and not deferred.

It presents right now the choice between inflation and deliberate efforts to restrict civilian demands. As we said in the Review for December, 1950, "The time has passed when inflationary pressures were merely threatening."

The forces of inflation are actively at work. If inflation is to be checked, a deliberate and adequate effort to reduce civilian demands must be made, through economy of expenditures by governments, businesses and individuals, through higher taxes, through credit restraints both general and particular, and through control over the use of scarce materials. And to give this view added point, it should be emphasized that in contrast to 1939, there is now an all too wide-spread expectation of rising prices which further strengthens inflationary pressures.

Bank Of Nova Scotia Monthly Report

One of the inevitable penalties of assuming that governments have bottomless purses or that countries have inexhaustible productive capacity is inflation. Inflation results from over-expending. It arises when the rate of expenditure out of line with that country's ability to increase its production. Its inevitable consequence is rising prices and rising costs of living.

Looking back over the past twenty-five years, it is interesting to note that a real problem of inflation in this sense did not arise until well after the beginning of the Second World War. Even in the boom of the late 'twenties demands on productive capacity were not generally excessive.

There was certainly no problem of inflation in the 'thirties, though in this decade much information was gathered and new concepts were developed about the operation of national economies which proved useful in assessing the problem of inflation and in devising appropriate policies when in the early 'forties it came to stay.

Thus, when the war came, it was well known in Canada, and also in the United States, that there was a substantial surplus supply of manpower, machinery and other resources which until largely absorbed would prevent the development of strong inflationary trends.
