Three of Spangleland's most outstanding bareback riding stars, Corky, June, and Ortans Cristiani, will be seen in action here when the huge King Bros. and Cristiani Combined Circus, the second largest in America, presents afternoon and night performances at Exhibition Park under the auspices of the Charlottetown Kinsmen Club. The Cristiani Family of somersaulting equestrians are conceded to be the most talented group of bareback riders in the world.

King Bros. Cristiani! Mention those names, and there's hardly a need to add circus. The whole American continent now knows their meaning. These famous attractions combined into one mammoth circus with many of Spangleland's greatest features, will arrive in Charlottetown early tomorrow (Sunday) and spend their Sabbath in a quick day of rest in preparation for the performances here Monday.

Caravans of gilt, glitter, spangles, clowns, wise old elephants with flopping ears, bands, calliope and what-not, will come rolling into town about dawn and quietly proceed to install its encampment of 22 tents at Exhibition Grounds, where at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon and at 8 o'clock at night, it will display its wares to youngsters of all ages under the auspices of the Charlottetown Kinsmen Club.

The street parade, the only one of the old-time variety in Charlottetown, is scheduled to arrive downtown Monday morning about 11:30. With several bands, air and steam calliope, tableaux wagons and float-carts, and allegorical units, scores of open stands and cages, filled with wild jungle beasts, and great lines of mounted circus folk, the picturesque and spectacular parade will pass in review. It is said to be the most colorful circus parade in history.

The big show will be here only tomorrow and Monday. It will bring many attractions new to circus fans, plus several of the old favorites whose merits demanded their continuance with the show this year.

Visitors at the circus grounds tomorrow will have much to see and admire. Acres of tents being raised including the gigantic big top which seats nearly 7,000 persons. The grooming and feeding of the hundreds of animals, both wild and domestic, and the big show's traveling cafe where nearly 1,800 meals are served each day. The barber shop, the general store, the blacksmith shop and the traveling hospital will no doubt attract the curious as will the working elephants as they help hoist the big top and "spot" their heavy wagons about the grounds. But it will be at 2 and 8 p.m. Monday that the real thrill of circus day takes place—when Col. Harry Thomas, the dean of equestrian directors, sounds his whistle and the King Bros. and Cristiani Concert Band, leads the exciting, colorful "march" around the hippodrome track, the prelude to the opening spectacle, "Persia" and the gala three ring, two stage program of 1953 features that follow.

The highlight of the performance here, of course, will be the world renowned Cristiani Family of bareback riders featuring Lucio Cristiani, the greatest riding comedian the world has ever known.

Next in importance perhaps, will be the Hermanos Rodriges, breathtaking aerial stars who perform in the dome of the big top without a net below. The Carole Troupe, high-perch thrillers, Jerry Pressley, the tight wire star, and James Millette, the suicidal aerialist from England. Charlottetown audiences will see the same great program that has thrilled tens of thousands daily so far this season. All of the stars and features will be seen here without a single exception.

The Ortans Troupe, famous teeter-board acrobats featuring beautiful Ortans Cristiani, billed as "the greatest lady acrobat in the world"; Hugo Zaccchini, the man who is shot from a giant cannon from one end of the big top to the other; the Piccadilly Troupe, risley artists from England, their first tour of this country; the Wilson Trio and the Bel-Aire Troupe, high-balancing marvels; the Dingler Troupe, aerial-bar performers; and the Cambera Troupe, all-girl acrobatic display from Australia, their first appearance in America, are but a few among the more than 150 men and women acrobatic stars and performers with the big show this season.

Still other highlights include, in addition to the numerous horse, pony, and animal displays, such thrilling and spectacular numbers as the swinging-ladder girls, the beautiful "Aerial Ballet" in which 20 aerial beauties take part, and the almost countless ring and track stunts featuring many of Spangleland's top-flight performers.

Three herds of performing elephants; three rings full of prancing liberty horses and tiny Shetland ponies; the revival of the acrobatic "leaps" over five elephants, and literally dozens of others.

And the youngsters will be pleased to know there will be an even 30 clowns on hand at each performance together with their clown animals and their clown band.

For the convenience of circus patrons, a branch ticket office will be in operation Monday at the Hughes Drug Store at 150 Queen Street, where reserved seat chairs will be on sale for both performances at the same prices charged at the circus grounds.
