Livestock Men Hear Talk On Meat At Cardigan

On Friday night the Livestock Producers were invited by Swift's Canadian Co. Ltd., to attend a meeting at which the company representatives explained their part in meat processing and distribution.

Mr. D. C. Tonkins, Swift's manager for P. E. I. spoke briefly and introduced the main speaker, Mr. Jorgens, who opened his remarks by comparing the Maritimes with his own country in Western Canada. He corrected the view held by many people from this end of the Dominion that the Prairie Provinces are all flat or rolling land with few trees, and explained that about two-thirds are covered by forest before land clearing takes place.

Mr. Jorgens stated that while the producers tried to bring the livestock to the point where it was ready for market, the job of the packing company was to slaughter and distribute the product as efficiently and economically as possible. He explained the details and background for a film which was shown immediately after his address.

As meat is a perishable product, it is necessary to carry out all operations as rapidly as possible. This is made more difficult as the chief markets for surplus meat of any region is in Ontario and Quebec which are usually as much as 1,000 miles from the point of supply. The sales methods of the industry follow two main systems. In one method the carcasses are placed in the cooler where the retailer selects the meat he wants and then proceeds to bargain with the company salesman for it. Mr.

"DEER CARCASS FOUND — It was learned Saturday that a deer carcass was found on Friday near the light house at Panmure Island. Speculation was rife concerning whether or not it was one of the deer released in this Province some time ago. However, it is now thought that it was a deer carried to the Island by the spring ice flow.

Jorgens stressed that no price was fixed beforehand. Therefore the salesman received all the current conditions of the market, thus allowing it to pass on to the producer. By the other method, delivery routes are maintained either direct from the plant or through branch houses.

He stated that by-products play an important part in the industry today. The bone, hides, and ears are used; also the blood which is used in the manufacture of buttons, and as an adhesive in the construction of Mcadam roads. The glands are also used for the production of Acth, Cortisone, and Insulin. The sale of such by-products brings the receipts for such an animal up so much that often the packer is able to pay the producer more for his product than the retailer pays for his carcass of meat.

A film entitled "Meat On The Move" was shown. It followed the livestock from its grazing grounds through all the different marketing agencies to the packing house, where it was slaughtered, weighed, and inspected. Another film showed a round-up of horses on an Alberta ranch, and also a scene from the Calgary Stampede.

Chinese and North Koreans fought as viciously as they ever have in the conflict. Fresh enemy troops were reported on the western front. Battered units were strengthened. Red artillery fire increased.

There was no indication that the enemy had slackened in any way despite the cease-fire proposal of Jakob Malik, Russian delegate to the United Nations.

Malik proposed Saturday that both sides in Korea confer on a cease-fire, armistice and withdrawal of troops from the 38th parallel. That was the boundary over which the Russian-trained North Korean army surged across at 11 points at 3:30 a.m., one year ago in what the U. N. branded "open and naked aggression."

In a speech prepared beforehand, Syngman Rhee, president of the Republic of Korea, pleaded: "Let us resolve that instead of hoping for speedy return of peace which may be a dishonor to us and to the United Nations, we should have patience and keep on fighting with unyielding spirit."

Aerial War Blazes

The aerial war blazed again Sunday for the seventh day in the last eight. Twenty-seven unusually aggressive Russian-built Migs eluded the equally swift U. S. F-86 Sabre Jets guarding the air corridor known as "Mig Alley" in northwest Korea. Twice they jumped 14 lower F-80 Shooting Stars on a low-level strafing mission. The Migs also took after an unarmed F-80 photo-reconnaissance jet in a third flurry.

Four Migs were positively damaged and two others believed damaged in the ensuing fights. One F-80 was shot down by ground fire just prior to the attack.

Allies Yield Ridges

On the ground, Allied units yielded two important ridges south of Pyongyang, 29 miles north of the 38th parallel and northern tip of the old Red triangle. The infantrymen fell back after a day and a half of bloody bayonet fighting.

One hill changed hands six times before charging Chinese won possession of it.

Front-line reports said a fierce fight raged for commanding ridges northeast of Kumhwa. The hill mass protects the approaches to Kumsong, new Red buildup zone. Kumsong is 12 miles northeast of Kumhwa and 29 miles north of 38.

A strong Allied task force knifing northwest of the Chorwon-Sibyon road in Western Korea had to fight its way out of an attempted enemy encirclement.

There were indications of increased enemy artillery massing on the western front.

A pooled field dispatch said increased enemy activity in the west indicated the peak of buildup strength.

A limited counter-offensive by the Chinese to coincide with the first anniversary of the war had been anticipated by front-line officers.
