ATTEND CONFERENCE

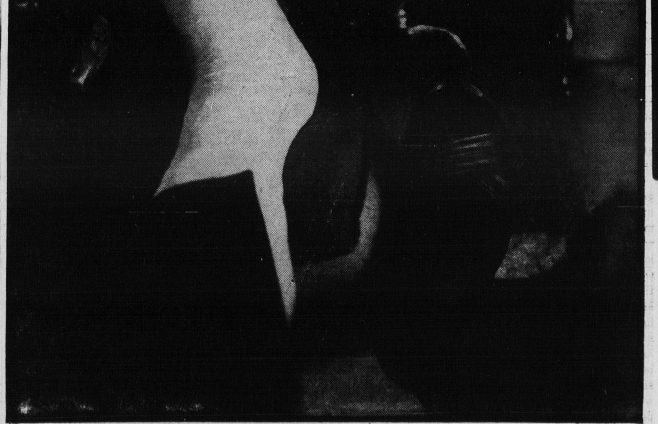
