

Farmers Discuss Fallout Problems

Farmers, agricultural department staff members, and civil servants in this province are receiving a concentrated course here on measurements suggested for survival in the event of nuclear attack or fallout.

Members of the staffs of the federal and provincial departments of agriculture were receiving instruction at Birch Court yesterday.

The civil servants will gather at the same spot this forenoon and afternoon, and 100 or more of the province's leading agriculturists are expected to gather at Birch Court Wednesday evening to hear the latest news on nuclear fallout on the farm, and suggestions on how to deal with the problem.

Agriculture Minister Andrew B. MacRae was chairman yesterday for the course for departmental members.

R. C. Parent spoke on "Nuclear diseases—contamination of soil, crops and livestock and their protection."

A panel comprising Brigadier A.W. Rogers, emergency measures officer for the province; C. O. Simons, coordinator of civil defence, and Dr. B.H. Henry, district veterinarian and a film on fallout completed the general outline of the instruction.

Premier Feels Fit

Premier Walter R. Shaw yesterday termed "just speculation" suggestions that he intends to retire after the Dec. 10 general election and seek the post of lieutenant-governor of the province.

Most recent suggestion was made by Liberal candidate Dr. M.L. Bonnell, in an election campaign television address.

"It's just speculation," the premier said. "The Liberals drew that one out of some barrel of peculiar ideas."

"Why should a young fellow like myself, in the middle of age and good health, want to retire?" Premier Shaw will be 75 years old Dec. 20.

"I don't know," he declared. "There is a chance she might be transferred to Germany and that would suit her fine. "It would be terrific for my track. There are better javelin throwers there than in Canada and that means there must be real good coaches."

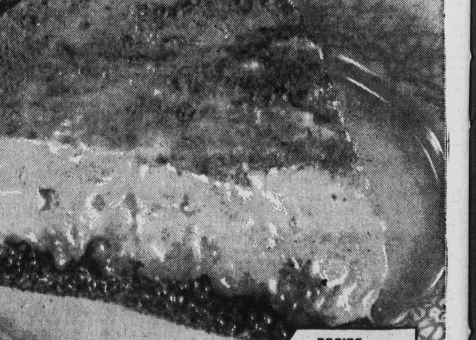
