

# Rider End Bobby Simpson Tops Big 4 League Scorers

TORONTO (CP) — Homebrewed Bobby Simpson, a veteran of the seasons with Ottawa Rough Riders, tops the Big Four football league scorers with 24 points although his team is stuck deep in last place with four straight defeats.

The 29-year-old pass-catching star scored his fourth touchdown Saturday as Montreal Alouettes defeated the Riders 22-7 and import back Verly Switzer of the Alouettes came up with the highest scoring performance of the season.

The former Calgary Stampeder backfielder, who came to the second-place Alouettes in a trade for Pat

Abbruzzi, counted three touchdowns to move into a four-way tie for second place.

Statistics compiled by the Canadian Press show Simpson six points in front of Switzer, halfback Gerry McDougall of the defeated, league-leading Hamilton Tiger-Cats, and Paul Dekker of the Ticats and halfback Boyd Carter of the third-place Toronto Argonauts. Switzer, McDougall, Dekker and Carter each have scored three touchdowns.

**HELD SCORELESS**  
McDougall and Carter, tied with Simpson for the lead last

week, were held scoreless as Hamilton whipped Toronto 37-3 Monday. Dekker scored one touchdown to grab a share of second place.

Halfback Bill Bewley, Alouettes' placement-kicking specialist, is in sixth place with 17 points on nine converts, two field goals and two singles. He kicked three converts Saturday but slipped from the fourth to the sixth spot in the scoring race.

Steve Oneschuk, Hamilton's field goal and convert kicker, follows Bewley with 11 converts, one field goal and one single for 15 points.

In the Ontario Rugby Football Union import halfback Ernie White of Sarnia Golden Bears scored five touchdowns and a convert Monday to move into a tie with import backfielder Terry Meyer of Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen for the scoring lead with 36 points each. White has counted five touchdowns, five converts and a single while Meyer has scored six touchdowns.

Ed Beattie of London Lords is in third place with 30 points on six touchdowns.

Eddie and Liz arrived in Paris from London Monday on a two-day clothes buying trip before returning to the United States Wednesday.

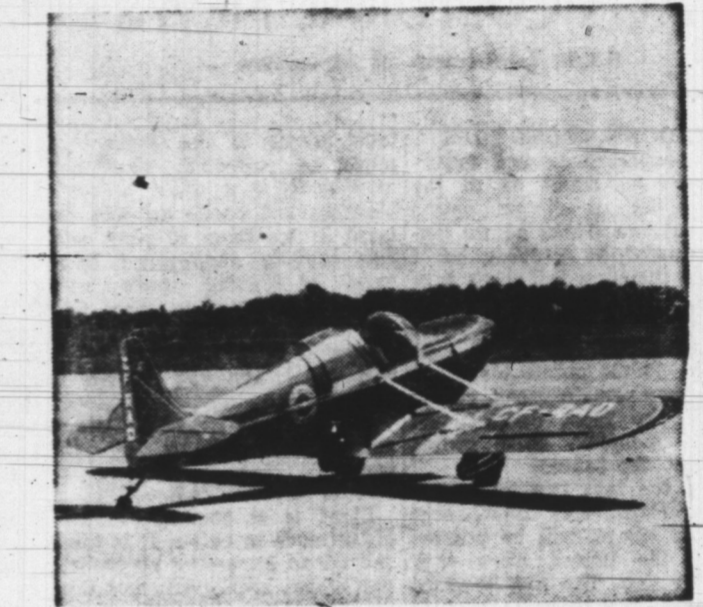
Apparently Ingo arrived here about the same time. He checked out of the Avoy Hotel in London Monday leaving no forwarding address.
