47 Cases Face Magistrate In Court At Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — Provincial Magistrate James R. Johnston, QC, holding court at Georgetown on Wednesday, had before him a docket of 47 cases. James Reginald Bruce of Lymdale and Clifford Wilfred Larkin of Armadale on May 2 escaped custody of Riverside Hospital where they were being held on 30-day remand for observation, following their being charged in magistrate's court. Bruce had been charged in Queens County Court with seizing a girl against her will and Larkin in Kings County Court with the theft of a car. On Wednesday, both Bruce and Larkin were charged with seven offences each, alleged to have been committed following their escape from Riverside. The charges against each accused were: escaping custody from Riverside; looting in Charlottetown; breaking and entering MacKenzie's Garage in Cardigan and stealing a quantity of gasoline and motor oil; breaking and entering Matthew MacLean Clover Farm store in Bridgetown and stealing a quantity of cigarettes, cigarette papers and articles of clothing; breaking and entering MacDonald's Service Station at Little Pond and stealing a chain saw and \$1.49 in change; breaking and entering a cottage on the Duchenes Estate in Bay Fortune, owned by David Miller and stealing one jacket, some dishes and a box of assorted jewelry; and another charge of breaking and entering a cottage at Bay Fortune owned by Harold Saunders and stealing four blankets, a radio and a flash light. Both accused parties were remanded on the escaping custody charge to Queens County jail to May 11 when they will appear at Souris. The other charges against the accused were adjourned to Souris until May 11. Carl Gormley of St. Mary's Road and Harry Linden Stewart of Montague both pleaded guilty to impaired driving and were each fined \$100 and costs. Bernard Carl Butler, Gasperaux, pleaded guilty to a hit-and-run charge and was fined \$50 and costs while Joseph Blair Carter of Souris was convicted of driving while his license was suspended and was fined \$50 and costs. GEORGETOWN — At Thursday's sitting of Supreme Court in Georgetown with Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan presiding, a petit jury found John Charles Martell, Georgetown, guilty of breaking and entering the residence of Quentin Mossman in Souris and committing assault. Martell was sentenced to serve two years in Dorchester Penitentiary. Deputy Attorney General, J. Arthur McGuigan, QC, presented a record of former convictions against the accused. The accused was represented by John Holmes. Crown witness in the Martell case were Quentin Mossman, Mrs. Margaret Mossman and Constable Daniel Wayne Durling, Souris detachment RCMP. The accused did not give evidence but called Paul Martell of Georgetown and Gerald Cormier of Montague as witnesses. Members of the petit jury included Aldous MacKenzie, foreman, of Morell, Peter Sauer of Savage Harbor, John R.
