**Outlines Proposals For Saving British Livestock Industry**

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

LONDON, July 6.—Walter Elliot, Minister of Agriculture, in a statement today outlined a government's permanent proposals for safeguarding the livestock industry in the United Kingdom.

He said the government intended to proceed on the basis of a regulated market, with the maximum supplies for consumers consistent with a reasonable level of remuneration for producers.

The government desires that the responsibility for securing stable market conditions should be assumed by the producers of various countries. To this end, it proposes an Empire meat council, representative of the United Kingdom, and other Empire countries, and an international meat conference, representative of the United Kingdom, Empire and foreign countries.

It is proposed that the aggregate exports and imports of frozen and chilled beef and meat equivalent to fat cattle during the next three years should not exceed certain levels. The government proposes also that United Kingdom producers of fat cattle should have a subsidy not exceeding \$5,000,000 (about \$25,000,000) annually.

Parliament will be invited immediately to give the necessary power to pass legislation providing for customs duties on imported chilled, frozen and other descriptions of beef and veal from foreign countries.

It is not proposed, however, that there should be duties on imports from Empire countries on such meats or on mutton and lamb from any country. The government proposes to continue the existing system of regulation of imports of mutton and lamb until 1937.

Thereafter it would have to be decided whether an international meat conference in association with the Empire meat council should operate with regard to exports of mutton and lamb.

The government also intends to ask Parliament to give it general power to regulate imports of livestock and meat, should need arise.

**Papers, Specialties Advance**

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

**MONTREAL, July 6**—Buoyed by a return of confidence after recent weak sessions, papers and specialties advanced as much as three points on Montreal Stock Exchange today.

A couple of highs for recent years were shattered as paper stocks, utilities, constructions, textiles and metals pressed forward in a late buying rush. Liquors declined.

Traders entered the market at the start for papers and St. Lawrence preferred touched 38 1/2, high in three years, before closing up two points at 35. Howard Smith and St. Lawrence Corp. firmed fractionally.

A three-point gain at 63 signaled a scramble for shares of Dominion Textile while International Nickel at 49 3/4, Hollinger at 13 1/4, Noranda at 58 1/4 and Smelters at 54 gained 1/4 to 1/2 each.

International Power preferred at 92 broke high records for five years with a two-point gain and Power and Shawinigan ruled steady to firm. Montreal Power, sold heavily, eased 3/4 to 30 1/4.

Late demand boosted Hamilton Bridge three points to 40 and Building Products 1 1/4 to 36 1/4. Foundation Company picked up a sizable fraction and Canadian Cement and Dominion Bridge held even.

C. P. R. advanced the minor fraction but narrow declines were shown by Associated Brewers at 9 1/4 and Canadian Industrial Alcohol at 6 1/4. Sales 17,221 shares; bonds \$13,000.

**Quebec Singles Title Won By Longtin**

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

**MONTREAL, July 5**—Three French-Canadians tonight held all but one of five Quebec provincial tennis titles outright with the fifth jointly earned by one of their number and an Ottawa.

Roland Longtin, Henri-Paul Emard and Mrs. Rene Bolle, made virtually a clean sweep of the tourney with Mrs. Bolle winning the women's singles, combining with Mrs. H. L. Beer of Ottawa for the women's doubles and with Emard for the mixed doubles title. Longtin succeeded Walter Martin of Toronto as men's titleholder then paired with Emard to shear Grant McLean and Ross Wilson, Toronto due, of the doubles title the Torontonians won last year.

Longtin, winner at one time or another during the last few years in nearly every important tournament in Quebec, defeated the well-known Marcel Rainville, another Montrealeur, in a four-set struggle yesterday, 2-6, 6-3, 7-5, 6-4 to win the Quebec men's singles title for the first time.

Mrs. Bolle conquered Mrs. Beer 6-3, 6-3 in winning the women's singles, also her first triumph in this event then stepped out on the court with Emard to beat Mrs. Beer and George Ledere, also of Ottawa, 4-6, 6-4, 6-4 in the mixed doubles final.

Both singles titles went undefended. Mrs. Dorothy Patrick, last year of Montreal but now of Vancouver, was not in the tournament, while Walter Martin also did not compete.

The one title Ontario did share proved a rout. Mrs. Beer and Mrs. Bolle scored almost at will against Mrs. Porter and Simone Bernadet and held complete command of the situation winning 6-1, 6-1.

Wilson and McLean defended their doubles title today against Longtin and Emard, the match being held over on account of the unusually heavy schedule yesterday.

The first set was desperately fought with the Montrealeurs finally winning 9-7. The next two were slightly easier as Emard shone at the net. The final score was 9-7, 6-4, 6-4.

**Perry Leader Of Davis Cup Team**

LONDON, July 5—Fred Perry, who Friday won the all-England singles championship and Saturday helped capture the Wimbledon title of the English Davis Cup team which will defend the trophy in the challenge round, July 25, 27 and 28.

With Perry, Henry W. "Bunny" Austin, George Patrick "Pat" Hughes and Charles R. D. Tuckey will compose the English team.

In the challenge round England will meet the winner of the inter-zone final between Australia and the European zone winner, either Germany or Yugoslavia.

**ANCIENT CHAPEL IN QUEEN'S GIFT**

LONDON, July 6 (CP) —St. Katherine's Chapel, Regent's Park, where Queen Mary attends service occasionally, is the only Royal Chapel which is in the gift of the Queen herself—that is, she can nominate clergy for it. The Bishop had no jurisdiction over it, except that exercised through his position on Chapel Chapter.

The chapel was originally set up by Matilda, wife of King Stephen, at St. Katherine's Hospital, east of the Tower of London. When the hospital was demolished to make way for St. Katherine's Docks, George IV set up the chapel anew in its present position.
